

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



HEALING

Happy April. March was a tough road for our congregation, the staff, your board, and me personally, following Rabbi Moskowitz's announcement that he is leaving our congregation. I know most of you share my feelings, and the feelings of the Board, that this is not what any of us wanted.

Some of you have reached out with questions as to the role of the board and the processes we follow. We, your Board of Directors, are elected

members of the congregation entrusted to maintain "the general management of the affairs, funds and property of the corporation" (ie. Temple Israel). This is how it is stated in the bylaws that guide us. Our twenty-one board members take their job very seriously, and have all signed a "board covenant" which outlines the many expectations that come with board service. We begin each meeting with The Prayer for Communal Leadership, reminding us that the work we do is sacred and we are working for "the needs of the community. Members take turns preparing D'var Torah lessons to help ground us and guide us in the wisdom of Torah. We have a regular agenda of business that we must attend to in order to keep our temple running smoothly. I am proud of the diversity of this board. They are all active in temple life and at least one board member can be found at most of the activities of our temple community. The current composition of the board has members ranging in age from their 20s to the 70s. We represent a total of 365 years of Temple Israel membership, with the average length of membership being 17 years. We represent a true cross section of our community as a whole, with occupations such as educators, a physician, attorneys, an engineer, business owners, a CFO, consultants, an artist and managers. We represent you, the congregation, very well. Our board has term limits (except for those that are elected President) that limit our consecutive time on the board to seven years. Our average current length of service is 4 years. In last month's Kol Yisra'el, Past President Steve Keiles, posted a "Board of Directors Recommendation Form". We have four board members rolling off the board in July and we are excited to welcome new members. (See his article for more information.) We are always looking for more congregants to step up and join us in serving the congregation. There are many opportunities from volunteering at a service or event, to serving on a committee or special task force, to serving on the board.

It is time now to begin the process of healing and look to moving forward. You should have received an email from Incoming President, Steve Gordon and myself mid-March. In this email we encouraged you to reach out to us. We also mentioned that during the next several months, we will host ongoing opportunities for the congregation to come together in

order to discuss the transition process and to shape our future. These meetings will be held at different times to accommodate as many congregants as possible. The first meeting will be held on Tuesday, April 9 at 7:00 pm at Temple Israel. Based on Rabbi Moskowitz's advice, we are currently seeking a consultant to examine our organizational systems, structure and bylaws. Rabbi provided a list of potential consultants for consideration, and we have two task force chairs (one board member and one congregant at-large) who are currently interviewing possible consultants. A task force will be formed to work on these changes. The Interim Rabbi Search Committee, chaired by Past President Rob Feldman, has begun their work. A "Settled" Rabbi Search Committee will be formed soon to begin the formal search to find our next spiritual leader. The congregation will be asked for input as we go through all these processes and will be informed of our progress as we move forward. Some of the changes to systems and structures may need a bylaw change, which will require congregational approval. Please make sure you read the monthly Kol Yisra'el and emails. We will post new meeting dates in a timely fashion so you may attend.

On a personal note of needing your thoughts for healing, some of you may have noticed that I haven't been around temple much lately. Unfortunately last month I, once again, I had a snow skiing accident resulting in the fracturing of my right leg. Some of you may recall that one of my first articles as President almost two years ago was titled "Lessons of a Broken Leg", as I recovered from my broken left leg. I am not sure what lessons I will learn from this break. Whether I hang up my skis this time, or face the fear and return to my passion is still to be determined. As many of you know who have also recovered from injuries, the process of healing broken bones is not an easy one. I truly appreciate the support I have received from all of our senior staff, the board, congregants, and of course my family.

In the spirit of healing, your Gemilut Chasadim (planned act of kindness) challenge for the month of April, is to reach out to someone who is need of healing. A note, a text, or a call are all appreciated when someone is battling an issue of mind, body or soul. Knowing someone is thinking of them can make all the difference.

Happy April. May spring bring us all a sense of healing, renewal and optimism that we will move through this together, as one united congregation.

- Actively promoting our organization and encouraging and supporting the staff.
- Serving on at least one committee with the goal of chairing a committee or sub-committee within two years of board membership.
- Acting as greeter and/or Board Representative at Services a minimum of four times per year and at the High Holy Days.
- Staying current with all personal financial commitments to
- Actively support fund-raising events of the Temple.

RABBI MOSKOWITZ OFFERS SUPPORT TO LONG BEACH ISLAMIC CENTER

An emergency meeting was held at the Long Beach Islamic Center on Friday, March 15, to show support for the Muslim community in the cities of Long Beach and Signal Hill after the mass shooting that occurred at two mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand, where at least 50 people were killed and 20 more were seriously injured.

Key figures were in attendance to show their support for the Muslim community, including local faith, political and law-enforcement leaders.

"Every time they take a life, one million lives are going to rise to resist them," said Tarek Mohamed, chairman of the Long Beach Islamic Center. "Every time they take and destroy one flower, we're going to replace it with a garden of flowers. They fight us with a bullet, we fight back with love and compassion."

Rabbi Steven Moskowitz from Temple Israel and Pastor Eric Marsh from Parkcrest Christian Church also came to show their support for the Jewish and Christian communities in Long Beach.

"Imam Tarek Mohamed is my brother," began Moskowitz. "We stand up with Mohamed. We will defeat those who attack us. We stand up together, and we shall prevail."

Mayor Tina Hansen pledged aid from the City of Signal Hill.

"It is important to come together, like we are here in our local community, and speak out against hatred and violence and pledge our support for this center and the community that worships here," she said. "On behalf of the City of Signal Hill, I want to pledge my city's support to the center, to your community that worships here and whatever resources you need from our city, our police department, from our staff, we are here for you."

Fourth District Los Angeles County Supervisor Janice Hahn thanked the Signal Hill and Long Beach Police departments for their "vigilant" protection of the mosques. Hahn condemned the attack, saying that "violence and murder are the inevitable consequence of hate and bigotry. We do not accept that, we will not be tolerant of that, nor in any way will we do anything except condemn that."

Hahn expressed her support to the Muslim community, adding how "we stand united today with you, our Muslim neighbors, and we stand with you every day. We support you, we will do everything we can to protect you, and we are here to tell you that you are a much loved and valued people in our communities, here in Signal Hill and throughout Los Angeles County."

Long Beach Mayor Robert Garcia was also in attendance and acknowledged Mohamed as a "brother and friend to all of us here in Long Beach."

He was joined by Vice Mayor Dee Andrews and councilmembers

Lena Gonzalez and Al Austin as he expressed their support on behalf of the City of Long Beach.

"This is a painful reminder that hate lives on, Islamophobia is real, and we must do everything in our power to defeat it," Garcia said. "On behalf of Long Beach, we stand with our Muslim community and neighbors and send our love to you, not just here at home, but across the world."

He added: "Our message is a community message. We love you, we support you, and we are with you always. We must always reject Islamophobia. We must always reject white nationalism. We must always reject anyone who chooses to attack the beauty of diversity, equality and freedom of religion."

The chief of the Signal Hill Police Department, Christopher Nunley, and chief of the Long Beach Police Department, Robert Luna, assured people in attendance that, although no credible threats had been indicated, to not hesitate to call if they witness anything suspicious.

"Fear is real, but how do we defeat that? It's vigilance," Luna said.

For Mohamed, the support from the community was reassuring.

"Your message means a lot to us," he said. "Our community feels a lot better that behind them [is] very great leadership and [a] great community."

NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY

It's award time in the Jewish library world. **The Association of Jewish Libraries** has chosen three books for their second adult fiction award:

Memento Park by Mark Sarvas (F SAR)

In order to recover a valuable painting stolen from his family in World War II, the protagonist of this suspenseful intellectual thriller must reconnect with his father, his family history, and his own Judaism.

The Cloister by James Carroll (F CAR)

The author melds the timeless love story of Abelard and Heloise with its impact on a priest and a Holocaust survivor in post-World War II Manhattan.

The Fourth Corner of the World by Scott Nadelson (F NAD) All the characters in this short-story collection abandon their lands of origin, sever their roots, and distance themselves from the people they once were.

The Sydney Taylor awards are given every year for the best in children's literature with a Jewish theme. The awards are given for younger readers, older readers, and teens. The following books were honored in three categories:

Gold Medal winners:

All-of-a-Kind Family Hanukkah by Emily Jenkins (YR JEN) Sweep: The Story of a Girl and her Monster by Jonathan Auxier (YR AUX)

In 19th century England, 10-year-old Nan Sparrow works as a chimney sweep. After she gets stuck in a fireplace, she winds up unharmed--saved by a golem, a creature of soot and ash.



INTERFAITH GREETINGS

Anne Frank's Stepsister - My Interfaith Guide

On March 6 I was treated to "A Historic Evening with Anne Frank's Childhood Friend & Stepsister" at Chapman University, sponsored by Chabad and cosponsored by the university's Rodgers Center for Holocaust Education and Fish Interfaith Center. That evening proved to be a total delight, as I learned more about Anne Frank, the Holocaust and an abiding

hope for the future from Eva Schloss, Anne Frank's stepsister.

My curiosity regarding Chapman, founded in 1861 as Hesperian College in Woodland, CA through the auspices of the Disciples of Christ, also spurred me on to find out more about the university. Hailed by The Forward - Chapman, CUNY & Lehigh universities were rated the three #1 US colleges in their 2018 Guide that are safest for Jewish students; based on the number of anti-Semitic incidents on campus (0) as well as the campus crime rate, prevalence of crimes covered by the Violence Against Women Act, local crime data and if the university has an LGBTQ center and campus support.

Gail Stearns, Dean of the Wallace All Faiths Chapel and Associate Professor of Religious Studies at Chapman University, "is proud that our campus is considered one of the safest campuses for Jewish students. Much of the credit goes to intentional dedication to educate our campus about Judaism in creative and meaningful ways, and to create a safe space for Jewish students. The Rodgers Center for Holocaust Education offers incredibly rich programming to connect our Jewish students with Holocaust survivors and to educate the entire campus. The Fish Interfaith Center works closely with Jewish students and has a part-time director of Jewish life, working to ensure Hillel, Chabad and Jewish students have both the space and the resources needed for their programs."

The main chapel has no iconography and the smaller chapel features interchangeable symbols of multiple faiths. The chapel features the Interfaith Center's philosophy: an interchangeable set of holy symbols which plug into a handcrafted chapel display creating one of three major symbols: a cross, a crescent moon, and a 6-pointed star. Dean Stearns hopes to expand these symbols to include even more faiths.

Chapman's Jewish student body (10%) has active Hillel and Chabad groups, that partner with other student and spiritual groups; organizing events such as a Halal/Kosher dinner where Muslim and Jewish students share food from each other's traditions. They are hoping that this new tradition will continue and expand to include even more religious groups. Both Fish Interfaith Center and Wallace All Faiths Chapel see themselves as a living testament to Chapman's open approach to spirituality. Dean Stearns believes that "an interfaith approach can be a force for good that aids in the search of common purposes such as peace. The more we bring people together to understand each other's religions, the more it's not foreign or suspect," Stearns said. "People begin to understand that we're all human."

Little did I know that Eva Schloss would lead me on an interfaith journey--right in my own backyard! Shalom, salaam, peace!







