

RESTART

We already started our Jewish year in September with Rosh HaShanah, when we celebrated the entrance of the year 5779 with apples and honey. During this time of reflection we looked back, atoned for our past year's transgressions(?), and looked forward to the year ahead. During the secular New Year, the emphasis is more on looking ahead and

setting goals. I always think of it more like a restart - another beginning. A chance to once again look at my personal goals, see how I am doing, and restart the goals that fell by the wayside in the busy months at the end of the year. CONGREGATION STEPS UP TO HELP LOCAL HOMELESS!

Members of our Congregation and community have jumped in with both feet to meet immediate, urgent needs of homeless individuals in Long Beach. Much of this work has been done through Wrap the Kids, a grassroots registered 501(c)(3) run by homeless helping other homeless people. (Check them out on Facebook, or *wrapthekids.org*). They serve the chronic homeless, many of whom live under the freeways and along the riverbed in North Long Beach. Efforts also supported We Care and the Drop-In Center at First Congregational Church in downtown Long Beach. We are networking not only with individuals, but organizations are working together!

Some highlights of what we have been able to do a in few short weeks:

- Transferred extra food and toys from food banks in East Long Beach to North Long Beach—including 250 pounds of frozen catfish from Emmanuel Church food bank!
- Assembled and delivered 300 hygiene kits, thanks to Lenore Roth, Barry & Jean Potter, Cathy Barnett, Eman and George. Myron Wollin helped cut fabric for blankets.
- Collected and immediately distributed jackets, blankets and camping equipment.
- Provided bus tokens for transportation to doctors, social services, etc.
- Provided coats and other support for the Santa's North Pole event being held for local homeless kids where they can take a photo with Santa and choose a gift and book and the family can take home food, blankets and jackets. Harriette Ellis is doing publicity. Secured a location through 8th District Councilman Al Austin.
- Procured \$1100 donation for blankets and toys from the local Lions Club.
- Michelle Gordon and Deborah Lewis organized a Mitzvah & Merlot event on Jan. 31 at 6:30 pm at the Alpert JCC with NCJW, the JCC and three local temples to assemble 50 blankets. TI Sisterhood will provide the \$500 for the fabric.
- Dan Felsenthal, CPA, is helping Wrap The Kids with a tax reporting issue, pro bono.
- Jo Anne Kaabar collected 200 kids' books.
- Christian Outreach donated a pallet of 5 gallon containers of ice cream to the Drop-In Center.

Thank you, everyone! Special thanks to Cathy Barnett and Lenore Roth for taking on key roles! And thanks to our facilities staff, who has repeatedly jumped in to handle logistics and schlepping and clean up.

SPECIAL" WISH LIST"

One result of the rise of anti-Semitism in the United States and the world, the massacre at the synagogue in Pittsburgh, and the targeting of Jews elsewhere has been the proliferation of lists of books about Jews, Judaism, and anti-Semitism. This special "wish list" has been compiled from suggestions from the New York Times, the Jewish Book Council, and the Association of Jewish Libraries. Any one of them would be a great addition to the adult section of our library.

The Chosen Wars: How Judaism Became an American Religion, by Steven R. Weisman. "Since Jews were no longer waiting for the messiah, they would embrace a high-priestly mission to act as models of ethical behavior. Action in the world would define them." (\$30.00)

The New American Judaism: How Jews Practice Their Religion Today, by Jack Wertheimer. "A rich, complex and at times contradictory religious system has been reduced to a set of vague slogans." (\$29.95)

The Jewish American Paradox: Embracing Choice in a Changing World, by Robert Mnookin. "If you feel yourself to be a Jew, you get to be one." (\$28.00)

God is in the Crowd: Twenty-First Century Judaism, by Tal Keinan. Israel and American Jews have created a bi-polar Jewish world with two centers of Jewish life, representing opposed values. (\$28.00)

Dear Zealots: Letters from a Divided Land, by Amoz Oz. "I regard blind obedience as a deviation from tradition even when it purports to be the embodiment of that tradition." (\$23.00)

On Modern Jewish Politics, by Ezra Mendelsohn. "Explores the different approaches taken by East European and American Jews toward anti-Semitism." (\$19.89)

Warrant for Genocide: The Myth of the Jewish World Conspiracy and the Protocols of the Elders of Zion, by Norman Cohn. Since its publication in 1967, it has been reissued several times and is a classic history of anti-Semitism. (\$40.78)

A Lethal Obsession: Anti-Semitism from Antiquity to the Global Jihad, by Robert Wistrich. This is an encyclopedic history of anti-Semitism since 1945 and drives home the author's argument that the tradition of discrimination against Jews did not end after the Holocaust. (\$50.00)

When Christians Were Jews: the First Generation, by Paula Fredriksen "This is the gripping story of the early Jewish followers of Jesus...as they awaited the end-time." (\$27.50)

PRESERVING OUR HISTORY

many our congregants know, Temple will Israel celebrate its 100th anniversary in February of 2024. That's not too far off; therefore an Archives Committee has been formed, and we are in the process of collecting any and all memorabilia our members might have tucked away in closets, bureaus and on shelves,

long forgotten. (How about your storage unit?)

As part of our preparation for this stellar event, it was suggested by one of our past presidents, Amy Lipeles, that a column should appear each month in our K'ol Yisrael offering little bits of historical information about our temple, so that our new and newer congregants might become better acquainted with what happened in the past and how we arrived at today! You'll read here some stories and quotes from our longtime members that should prepare you to better enjoy our upcoming anniversary.

For starters, I wondered how many of you have strolled down the back hallway at temple and come upon that huge stained glass six-pointed star hanging on the wall near the elevator? Agreed it's no great work of art, but it does have lots of our history locked in. According to Bonnie Lowenthal, one day sometime in 2005, a contractor who was working on reconstructing an old building at 439 West Anaheim Street, recalled that Bonnie had been a City Council member and had served in the State Assembly. He called her with an object he "excavated" and thought she might be interested. He also knew Bonnie was a member of Temple Israel and figured it had been part of the architecture of our first synagogue. Sure enough, he had found this leaded glass star (in need of repair), which had probably been displayed on the front wall of the old temple or even inside above the Ark. Bonnie had it transported to our present site at Third and Loma, and it now has a permanent home, only on Loma instead of West Anaheim!.

So, dear congregants, do you have some buried treasures regarding Temple Israel in your home or garage that should be properly archived? Newspaper clippings especially would be helpful, old bulletins, photos, etc. Our committee has all the proper equipment to archive any memorabilia you may have to keep it safe for many generations to come. Look around and let any member of our committee know. We can pick it up, or you can just bring it to the temple. We'll take it from there. Thank you.







INTERFAITH GREATINGS Interfaith Delegation to the Mexican Border By Roni Love, SCIC Member

One of the South Coast Interfaith Council's core values is to provide and advocate for marginalized people – the poor, the hungry, the homeless and the refugee. Early in December, members of the SCIC family traveled to the Mexican border with a group of interfaith clergy and lay leaders as part of the Matthew25/Mateo25 Movement which is a growing national coalition of over 200 churches and Christian organizations, committed to standing with vulnerable communities. They are

a local Southern California expression of the larger national

movement whose current focus is defending vulnerable

immigrant communities.

Matthew25/Mateo25 is deeply involved in advocacy work focusing on undocumented immigrants who are threatened with mass deportation; refugees being banned from our borders, despite having been rigorously vetted; as well as African Americans, Muslims and people of color who have been threatened with racial profiling, policing, banning, monitoring and more.

Two of SCIC's board members, Rev. Dr. Rachel Nyback of St. Cross Episcopal Church in Hermosa Beach and Sara Deen of the South Bay Muslim community were among those who traveled in the caravan of interfaith and lay leaders. Their goal - to increase awareness of the plight of immigrants who have traveled to our border from Central America seeking refuge and asylum. In turn, they will provide the SCIC's interfaith community with a firsthand account of what is being faced by the marginalized asylum seekers and inform our interfaith community of ways in which we, at Temple Israel and the SCIC community, can provide help and support. As we learn more, I hope you will join me in this very pressing, important and vital effort.
