RABBI FOX'S MESSAGE / CANTOR'S MESSAGE



THE TORAH AS WATER

We have a number of different ways that we refer to the Torah. Some call it a book, others liken it to a tree, but the image that has always been the most striking to me is I think one of the least expected. In a handful of texts sprinkled throughout the rabbinic canon writers liken the Torah to water. There are a number of reasons for this, the rabbis like to draw natural metaphors for any number of ritual practices, objects, and beliefs, and our tradition has always had a deep connection to the natural world,

as have we. They also say that it is a source of sustenance to the people who study it. I'd like to suggest one other reason as well, and that has to do with this time of the year.

At this point we have emerged from the central celebrations of the High Holy Day season. We have warmed up with Selichot, marked the new year with Rosh HaShanah, and done the deep inner work we are called to on Yom Kippur. We have spent a week enjoying the natural beauty of our world with Sukkot and we conclude it with the celebration of Simchat Torah. It seems like odd timing. Wouldn't it make sense to finish the reading of the Torah before the end of the year, and then pick up the new year with the first Torah portion? Instead, we read that first Torah portion four weeks after we celebrate the new year. In the intervening time we read any number of other sections, including the very end of the Torah as we celebrate a cycle of reading coming to a close.

What a beautiful way to begin a new year, ironically with an ending. The Jewish sense of time is not like others, rather than seeing things on a straight line with a finite beginning and end, we see them in a circle. At the beginning of the year, we take a look at the cycle of things and that can offer a reminder of hope. If things can end, so too can they begin.

And so we come back to the image of Torah as water. We end the year having read through the entire Torah, each week reviewing its well-worn words and stories. It would be understandable to then place the work aside, finish up the last handful of verses in Deuteronomy and move on to the Prophets, or any other body of Jewish literature, but we return back to the beginning because there is still more to learn from it. If you review carefully the texts that talk about the Torah as water, they rarely describe the physical object, or even the words themselves, but instead almost always make mention of water when talking about what we learn from the ancient text. Like a spring, we drink in the words of the sacred books, and as if by miracle the well continues to yield and does not run dry.

This Simchat Torah, as we celebrate, I invite us to revel in the gift of our sacred word that continues to bring sustenance to us year after year, the same texts with new meaning, new inspiration. May it renew our faith that the well of inspiration, Torah or not, does not have to run dry, and that we live in a world of abundance. Let us drink in the words, starting with our first verse...

With little time, we created a task force of incredible minds and committed lay leaders, including myself, Christina Boatwright, Howard

Ort, Mark Dressner, Steve Gordon, Jerry Levy, Paul Levitt, Joanne Levy, Eric Shatzkin, and Rabbi Fox. Together, we worked tirelessly to create an experience that would be as close to "home" as is possibly could. The incredible Paul Levitt, our audio/visual magician, along with Jerry Levy, a photographer in his own right, worked their magic to encapsulate Temple Israel's HHD's through the faces of this community. Rather than focusing on the building or the sanctuary, Paul's camera lens captured the faces that help to make this community the diverse and special place that it is. David York and our phenomenal quartet brought us closer together, as they shared the music that inspires us year after year.

On a personal note, this experience allowed me to learn new skills and experiment with ways to connect with our community on a deeper level. I can now add "video creator and editor" to my resume... pretty cool!

Sushila Love was the glue that put it all together. Her creativity and ability to help us feel as though we were sitting in the sanctuary. Joslyn Sarshad, our glorious soprano, mixed all of the music, as each singer recorded themselves from their own homes. It was clearly a team effort and one that was truly life changing.

I am so proud to be a part of this community and one that will do whatever it takes to create a home for our community, whether it is inside our beautiful building or sitting in our own living rooms.

May this year be one of renewal and strength. A year filled with abounding blessings, spiritual restoration, and continued community connection.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

VOLUNTEERS, EXTRAORDINAIRE

Over the last 6 months, our conversations, activities, meetings, and virtually everything we have done over that time, have been dominated by the Coronavirus Pandemic (after writing this sentence, I smiled at my use of the word "virtually." There was no pun intended, but it certainly fits our current landscape). I have written about alternative programming, and the efforts of clergy, staff, and lay leaders alike, to develop meaningful opportunities for our engagement. My

article last month dealt with the High Holy Days, and what our experiences could be, given the current limitations. It is my hope that when reading this, you are coming off a meaningful High Holy Day experience. I further hope that when we welcome in year 5781, our wishes of Shanah Tova will be done face to face, with handshakes and hugs.

This month, I would like to share with you an observation I recently made. As president, I have the privilege (some might use a different word, but I'm going with privilege) of attending a whole bunch of meetings. These meetings are typically Zoom gatherings of various committees. Some of these groups I gave a shout-out to during my remarks on Rosh HaShanah, but there are others who are equally deserving of our thanks and appreciation. They include, but are not limited to, the following:

Rabbi Transition Committee – Co-chaired by Melissa Newman and Jan Stein, this is a group of people who have been charged with easing Rabbi Fox and his family's transition into our community. They are the folks who have arranged the meet and greets. They have developed the opportunities to "Ask Rabbi Fox." And they produced the fabulous interview conducted by Adolfo Guzman Lopez. At the most recent meeting I attended, one of the agenda items was to evaluate the events that have been done so far, as well as to discuss additional ways for Rabbi Fox and the congregation to become further acquainted.

High Holy Days Task Force – This committee, led by Rabbi Fox and Cantor Hass, had the extremely difficult task of trying to make the High Holy Days something more than simply another set of services for us to watch on our computers. And while Rabbi and Cantor were responsible for the spirituality of our experience, the technical aspect was an enormous component of the project. I would like to express a sincere and heartfelt thank you to Paul Levitt, Jerry Levy, Adam Brown, and Sushila Love, for their effort, creativity, and dedication. The number of hours they put into this was above and beyond. It was largely behind the scenes, and unknown to most, but well deserving of our appreciation.

Re-entering the Building Task Force – I wish I could say this group no longer needs to meet, but sadly, that's not the case. Even with no real end in sight, this committee is meeting on a regular basis, evaluating current conditions, and discussing what makes sense for us to do, in addition to what not to do. Thank you to Eric Shatzkin, for recognizing the need, and for putting this very talented group together. Thank you also to all those serving on the committee, and for lending us your expertise. It is greatly appreciated.

Budget and Finance Committee – In addition to the ongoing work of developing and monitoring our budget, this committee is engaged in the study of our long term financial sustainability. This project was the brainchild of our treasurer Rick Burney, and is a much needed evaluation of our anticipated revenues and expenses. It is just getting started, but the various data are falling into place. As a fluid project, it will be updated as time goes on, with actual figures taking the place of assumptions.

Next 100 Years Campaign – Thank you so much to Amy Lipeles, who envisioned what this committee could do, and who did not stop cajoling all of us until the results of her efforts began coming to fruition. Thank you also to Janet Schultz and Susie Amster, for partnering with Amy to lead this group on its very important goal of providing financial sustainability to our beloved synagogue.

Temple Israel Foundation – The Foundation is a completely separate entity, but its charge is to raise and manage funds for the benefit of Temple Israel. Alan Lilien, as newly installed president of the Foundation, oversees a board of trustees dedicated to making good financial decisions.

Personnel Committee – The complexity of human resources functions and responsibilities are often and easily overlooked. Not anymore. Under the direction of committee chair Linda Burney, our newly formatted personnel committee is helping to develop processes and procedures for the many important human resources tasks that are so crucial to any place of business.

Digital Engagement Task Force – Alan Lilien (yes the same Alan Lilien who is Foundation president), has spearheaded the development of our digital presence, or more specifically, the creation of our new website. This project is long overdue, and I thank Alan and his team for the terrific work they have done.

Ritual Practices Committee – What's a temple without a ritual practices committee? Thank you to Mark Dressner for chairing this essential component of who we are and what we do.

Board of Directors - There is no way I could provide a list of committees without mentioning our board of directors. This is a group of 21 individuals who have donated a significant number of hours for the benefit of our temple. From developing and implementing policy, to evaluating and making financial decisions, the board's primary responsibility is that of representing its constituency, our congregation.

Each of these committees and task forces are engaged in their own individual slice of temple business. There is, however, one common denominator that I have witnessed in nearly every meeting I've attended. When I look around the Zoom Room, and listen to the participants, I realize that every single comment, and every single question, is motivated by one shared goal: How do we make, and keep Temple Israel the great place that it already is? Everyone has preferences. Some are in line with other's desires, and some are not. Either way, the commitment and passion displayed by all, I find to be breathtaking, and makes me proud.

I consider myself truly fortunate to be working with all these exceptionally talented individuals. And we, as a congregation, are equally as fortunate to be the recipients of all their hard work.

The celebration of Sukkot is so much fun because it is centered around being with others, enjoying each other's company in a meaningful way. This will be quite a challenge this year as we still have the need to physically distance ourselves. Oddly, in many ways this restriction has added a way to be together that we had never anticipated. I have attended game parties with friends and family from several states. Pesach was actually quite

amazing being able to attend a local seder virtually (Thank you!) and the second night having a family seder virtually with family in the bay area, Florida, and New York. Our own Temple Israel online havdallah has added a new dimension to many of our weeks.

I challenge you to reach out for Sukkot. Build your sukkah if that is your custom. Virtually invite people to your sukkah. Dine together on line. Take part in the nightly lulav and etrog ritual. If you do not have a sukkah then create your own virtual sukkah. Specifically plan nightly meals with friends or family using zoom or facetime or whatever mode works for you. Partake in the ritual, have a meal together, and just have fun.

One of the most intriguing elements of Sukkot is that of the Ushpizin. This is an Aramaic word for guests. Not only does one invite guests that are living and can attend in person or virtually, but you also should be inviting guests who are no longer living. The significance of inviting guests began when Abraham invited three guests into his tent. In spirit the following guests are always present: Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Moses, Aaron, and David. An interesting conversation for families would be to discuss what would you say to any of these ancestors? What would you ask? What would you share with them? With whom would you most like to talk? We can also make this more personal – which departed family members would you invite? In this tragic year of a pandemic would inviting someone who died too early from Covid 19 to your Sukkah to mourn and remember be meaningful?

The rituals of our year bind us together as a people. The Jewish calendar puts us slightly off kilter with the calendar and rituals of non Jewish people. There is something magical about being together as one but also being just slightly different from others around us. We feel it more this time of year with the density of ritual days. I revel in it. Lastly, Jewish holidays never fall "early or late this year", they fall exactly at the same time every year. Dear Temple Israel Family,

INTERFAITH GREETINGS Connections Across Cultures-Religions-Practices By Roni Love, SCIC Member

This past August 9th I was privileged to ZOOM onto Synagogue Tikyat Jacob's program featuring Mohammed Al Sawami - peace

Tikvat Jacob's program featuring Mohammed Al Sawami - peace builder, interfaith activist and author of *The Fox Hunt*, described by the New York Times Book Review as "a gripping account of terror and escape," a 2019 Nautilus Book Award winner, and a 2019 National Jewish Book Award finalist!

Born in Yemen he was deeply suspicious of both Judaism and Christianity, but after being given a copy of the Bible by a Christian teacher, he was confronted by the teachings of both the Torah and New Testament which, surprisingly to him, echoed the teachings of his Quran. "It says in both the Quran and the Talmud, 'Whoever saves a life saves the entire world. Thus began his journey to interfaith commitment and activism which ultimately saved his life when in 2015, a small group of strangers helped rescue him from an almost certain death in Yemen, amidst its brutal civil war.

Mohammed is committed to the interchange of core values defining our three Abrahamic traditions of Islam, Judaism and Christianity, advocating interfaith learning and action across Muslim, Jewish and Christian communities and by fostering an environment of learning, respect, and social change. He has encouraged interfaith work through his founding of and work with Abrahamic House and his peace activism with Yemeni Peace Project, speaking on topics as far ranging as Islamophobia and antisemitism, youth empowerment, the refugee crisis, overcoming disabilities, building bridges: interfaith dialogue across Islamic, Jewish, and Christian communities and steps we can take.

A major motion picture based on his book is now in production from Fox 2000 Pictures. Marc Platt, producer of La Land (nominated for Best Picture), and Josh Singer, Academy Award winner for best original screenplay - Spotlight, are developing a movie based on Mohammed's autobiography, "a story of an improbable escape as riveting as the best page-turning thrillers. *The Fox Hunt* reminds us that goodness and decency can triumph in the darkest circumstances."
