

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ANCHORS IN A TIME OF UNCERTAINTY

I write to you now at a time of uncertainty, none of us know what the outcome of the election will be and many of us are unsure of the outcome regardless of the results of Election Day. This election season has been contentious, derisive, and divisive. Regardless of your political beliefs, I imagine you have read or heard words that were deeply unsettling in the past few months and for many of us we have looked to a large group of people and found them acting in a way that was

radically different than what we might have expected or hoped. And so this is a time of uncertainty.

Our people has long lived with uncertainty, a wandering loose amalgamation of families that call one another kin while sharing a checkered past and a consistent migration from one place to the next. Charting any group of Jews around the world needs a great deal of patience and intellectual dexterity as the historian places pins chronologically zig-zagged across the map. We are a people used to change and uncertainty, so I offer these three anchors pulled up from the traveling ancestors we share regardless of bloodline.

First, remind yourself that you are a part of a family. As our people moved from one area of the world to the next we never lost sight of our greater relationship with one another. Throughout history we stayed in touch with other Jews through correspondence or reflection on texts, ideas, and teachings from glosses. This helped us remember that we were connected to one another, and able to support one another when needed. Who are the members of our support networks today? This is a time to turn to one another and seek comfort, companionship, and care. Know that Temple Israel is a critical part of that support network. We are here and hope to find every way we can to be present together during this time.

Second, learning is a source of joy and renewal. Even when there were no books present our community has always had learning as a central part of our practice. The reason why the Talmud is so hard to follow is that it was carried in the minds of our people even when we couldn't bring the page, free association allowed us to memorize it. Scholars in the past would turn the verses over and over in their minds even as they might travel from one place to the next. The words of our tradition a safe and stable soil on which to rest when the ground beneath their feet was moving. Rabbi Joseph Telushkin shares with us that when he is sad he does something possibly unexpected, he studies. During this time of uncertainty, I invite us to take the time to read, discuss and learn together, either cracking open a favorite novel or joining together for discussion at one of our Joys of Jewish Learning programs or classes.

Third, keep hope alive. I am surprised every time I get to the end of the Torah. I know that it's coming, but I'm always a little taken aback when Moses dies before entering the land of Israel. All of this build up, history from the very beginning to the moment of

redemption stops abruptly and we go back and read again from the beginning of the Torah. This is a reminder that we are always in a place of in-between, there is never a moment of total arrival, and no matter what the near future holds, we have enough history to see that in the same way that things can stretch back for thousands of years, so too can they stretch forward. This is not the end, and so we can always look to a future of new beginnings. I look forward to walking this future together.

As you are reading this, we are in the month of November, well known on stage and screen for the celebration of a holiday in which we give thanks for the blessings in our lives. Never before in my lifetime have I realized how many blessings I take for granted. During many Thanksgiving dinners, it's common to go around the table and share what we are thankful for. And not once have I ever mentioned any of the items I listed in the previous paragraph. There is nothing good about the pandemic we are all living through. But maybe, just maybe, it will provide me/us with a greater appreciation of the routine activities I had previously taken for granted.

All fine and good, and perhaps some truth. But what does any of this have to do with Zoom?...

Thanks for asking.

When it became clear that we would not be able to congregate (feel free to make up your own puns), conducting services and other events on Zoom was a natural. At first, it was simply a recording of Rabbi and Cantor speaking to us, saying prayers, and singing songs. This situation was only going to be for a few weeks. We didn't need to get creative or expand presentation. We would get past it and everything would return to normal. Well, not so fast.

What has happened since has been nothing short of phenomenal. There has been a conscious effort among clergy, Eric and Sharon to bring us the most meaningful and spiritual experiences as possible.

That includes breakout sessions following services to allow us to interact as we would during an Oneg Shabbat. The only thing missing is the extra cookie (but I guess I can take care of that on my own).

The creativity also includes being treated to a weekly musical interlude by David York, our long-time accompanist and musical director. How wonderful it will be to get back into the building. But how great it is to hear David's beautiful music.

"Anything Goes," the regularly scheduled interview program conducted by Eric and Sharon, has also become a favorite. Additionally, Cantor Hass has brought us new programming with her meditation sessions and book groups.

As I'm writing this, we are coming off a weekend in which our Zoom services very effectively captured the joyous Simcha Torah celebration. Enjoying the musical talents of a variety of congregants as others were dancing around with the Torahs was an absolute delight.

The title of this article is a bit inaccurate. The technology and capabilities of Zoom has not evolved over the last seven months. It is our utilization of the process that has evolved. Is it the same thing as being together in the building? Nope, sure isn't. But given the current situation, the creativity and innovation we are experiencing has been wonderful.

When on a Zoom call, we can see the number of folks who have tuned in, and the numbers have been very impressive. Now, I fully acknowledge that during a pandemic, people don't have play tickets, nor are they going to other events that would normally fill up a calendar. As a result, we are experiencing good attendance. I get that. But for those of you who have not participated in our services and other programs, I very strongly encourage you to do so.

In addition to services, our Joys of Jewish Learning events are also starting up. The JJL catalog is available online, and is filled with all kinds of programs to pique your interest. Is everything in the catalog for everyone? No, of course not. But is there something in there for everyone? Absolutely. All you have to do is look. You will not be disappointed.

The next time I am asked at a Thanksgiving dinner what I am grateful for, I will probably reply "Zoom." But that would not be accurate. The real answer is I am incredibly grateful for all the people I am working with who have made it their mission to provide us with meaningful and fulfilling experiences as best as they can during this very difficult time. The evolution of Zoom is not what Zoom has done for us. It is what we are doing with Zoom.

One last item before I let you go. It is very important that we, as lay leaders and staff, hear from you. We want to know what pleases you, and what displeases you. It is the responsibility of the board of directors to represent our constituency, which is you, the congregation. MESSAGE FROM CANTOR HASS



To My Temple Israel Community,

Over the last almost six years, it has been both a privilege and an honor to serve and to be part of the Temple Israel Long Beach community. During that time, I have partnered with three different rabbis, dedicated professionals and terrific lay leaders to deliver spiritual, educational, musical, and cultural Jewish leadership at Temple Israel.

I served with Rabbi Moskowitz for four years until he tendered his resignation. I

served with Rabbi Simon, our Interim Rabbi, who worked with me and the board as we prepared for our transition to our new settled rabbi. I excitedly welcomed Rabbi Scott Fox virtually as he entered Temple Israel for his first experience as Senior Rabbi.

With the onset of the pandemic, the staff was tasked with moving our community online, creating programing and unique opportunities that provided comfort and connection in this isolating time. During this unusual period, we transitioned to an online Gala event, using my contacts in the entertainment industry. Because Rabbi Fox was new to the community, I helped acclimate and guide him through our customs and traditions. Working together while adhering to the Covid-19 guidelines, the prerecorded High Holiday services served as a visible touchstone of spiritual leadership of the clergy team at Temple Israel.

During my years at Temple Israel I have developed deep relationships with our congregants, created innovative programing, arranged and composed significant musical experiences, counseled families and individuals of all ages, stood with congregants under their chuppah, officiated at countless B'nai Mitzvah, Brit Milah and baby namings, and held the hands of congregants who lost those they love. I have learned many transferable clergy skills from our lay leadership, Jewish professionals, educators and rabbis.

I am incredibly grateful for the many gifts I have received from the Temple Israel community; however, I have reached the moment when I must transition to the next chapter of my journey as a Cantor. For this reason, I will not seek to renew my contract when it expires at the end of the temple's fiscal and calendar year. I will wholeheartedly fulfill the remainder of my contract through June 30, 2021. Because of my deep love and affection for the Temple Israel community, this is a bittersweet moment, yet I look forward to the future and its many opportunities with much excitement knowing that I am a better Cantor because of my experiences here.


Dear Fellow Congregants,

HAZZAN

I was told recently that when Rabbi Kaelter conducted High Holy Day services he lead them all day. He had no help and was exhausted by the end of the day. How have services changed, even beyond Temple Israel, as a primary Cantor led experience in partnership with a Rabbi (who has as a major responsibility teaching based on Torah)? This led me to research about the history and role of a cantor.

After the destruction of the Second Temple, there were prayer leaders who lead services, particularly helpful for those with literacy issues. Around the 7th Century, prayer leaders began to chant interpretations and variation of these prayers. This was very individualized, called *piyutim*. From this musical interpretation of prayer the role of the cantor was born and developed. This leadership in synagogues continued from the Middle Ages until the 20th Century.

"Although the roles have changed somewhat in the present time, the template of the cantor as a religious and cultural functionary has largely remained. It is common for professional hazzanim to serve many functions in the modern synagogue-community, including teacher, pastor, chaplain, choir director, and cultural impresario."

"As participation in the music aspects of worship has grown, a tension has arisen between the desire to maintain traditional nusah on the one hand and to incorporate more contemporary and accessible melodies on the other. The significance of the tension goes beyond mere aesthetics, since nusah carries with it a wealth of religious, cultural and calendrical associations that are liable to be lost in the melodic substitutions."

"The heart of Hazzanut (Cantorial singing) is known as nusach. Nusach is based on modes, which in turn are based on scales, most of which have been preserved by us for hundreds of years. Although nusach always has a melodic pattern, no two Cantors sing it the same way, and improvisation is permitted as long as the general structure of the nusach is maintained. Thus, Hazzanim were free to sing the music differently, within certain guidelines."

"Ironically, the growing popularity of Hazzanim made a Hazzan a controversial community official. Their dual role of religious representative and artistic performer inevitably gave rise to tension, some of which persist into the present. In many communities, priority was given to a beautiful voice and musical skill over the traditional requirements of learning and piety. And hazzanim were known to vie for each other's prayer-poems and melodies."

"...cantors are generally charged with teaching members of the congregation how to participate in prayer services and read from the Torah. In this role, they often prepare children for their bar and bat mitzvah ceremonies and teach adult education classes. Furthermore, professional cantors will often perform pastoral duties such as conducting weddings, baby namings, funerals and unveilings."

Interestingly, perhaps the biggest contemporary influence on Cantors and Cantor education is the Jewish musical icon, Debbie Friedman. Despite the "summer camp" influence, Cantors are fully ordained with rigorous curriculum similar to a Rabbi. The primary role of a cantor in 2020 at services is to take the lead with prayers musically with a lot of freedom in interpretation of how to present and interpret the liturgy.

KOL M'YISRAEL / A VOICE FROM ISRAEL

Many of you already know me, but for those of you who do not, my name is Jeremy Rosen. Up until a few years ago my face could regularly be seen around the Temple. This changed for some reasons that have varied over time. At first, my moving to Berkeley for university explained the change. Now, it has to do with the fact I am currently living across the globe in Israel. This move will be the purpose of the column. I have been asked to correspond about

my experiences of living in the Jewish state. For this first entry, I think it appropriate to explain my journey that lead to the decision to move here.

While growing up, Israel was always taught to be the distant homeland of our people—both in distance and time. This is the land in which the Biblical myths transpired - full of miracles and epic heroes, from which our people were expelled, and which we have since held dear as a symbol of strength and liberty. In a separate realm of my mind existed the modern State. This is a State of which we should be proud - as protector of the Jews and symbol of their strength, ingenuity, and independence. But this is a place of duality, where although held in pride, kept even more distant by the reports of bus bombings and café attacks and rocket barrages befalling its streets, always closer to the wars of its neighborhood than the suburban pleasantness of my own.

As the time came in my Jewish teenager life, in the summer after my junior year of high school, I embarked on my first pilgrimage to the land. Even just at the gate and during the flight, a different atmosphere took hold, one less Gentile, more Jewish. Orthodox were praying in the aisles. Hebrew was on the intercom. Stepping off the plane at Ben Gurion, yes, the air was definitely indeed different. The air was heavy, wet, and hot to the point of oppression. Through the heat of the summer a tour bus drove me and a couple dozen other peers throughout Israel. We ducked out of the air conditioning for a couple hours at a time, associating ruins with the Biblical stories, hillsides to desperate battles of independence, and subtly varied villages of the many different tribes that cohabitate the Jewish state. We began learning about all the facts, intricacies, details, histories and realities of life in this county. One city, the one in which I now live, we seemed to skirt around to be kept as a sweet promise for later into the tour. This plan was interrupted by kidnappings and revenges in the eastern hills that led to a steadily increasing barrage of rockets being fired from a small territory carved into the southeast corner of the country. We continued our tour—with a forbidden sphere emanating from the source of the rockets. Occasionally our activities were interrupted by a siren and a scramble to the closest shelter or a duck-and-cover. The most striking aspect of the experience was the resilience-to-the-point-ofnumbness that the Israeli people faced in this situation that would have surely horrified their American compatriots. So the month ended. I returned home with a new connection and knowledge and pride for my ancestral homeland. - to be continued

INTERFAITH GREETINGS

Sukkot, Diversity & Unity: How Each of Us Is Like the Four Species

Chris Harrison's timely URJ article (condensed), augments our mission as a welcoming kehillah.

"Sukkot, to me, is the most audaciously hospitable of Jewish holidays as we invite others into our sukkah to dwell together as a community. Adding the citron, palm, myrtle

and willow we experience a commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion as each symbol is unique but stronger when bound together as a whole, as God commands us. "Bind them all together [into] one grouping" (Amos 9:6) so they may atone for one another just as we, no matter how many good deeds we perform, no matter how wise we are, has something to offer – and everyone is welcomed, equally and together, into the whole of the community.

I can't help but think about how this translates into audacious hospitality in our synagogues. Each of us is at a different stage of our journeys as Jews, including our journey to create more diverse, inclusive and welcoming communities; the same is true of our congregations.

Some of us, like the etrog/citron, have lots of experience and wisdom. Maybe we've been doing inclusivity and anti-bias work for years and have an ever-evolving knowledge when it comes to dismantling inequality and establishing equitable practices in our institutions. Some of us, like the lulav/palm, may be well-versed in history, knowledgeable of inclusive language, and familiar with race and queer theory, but haven't really put any of it to use. Some of us, like the hadass/myrtle, may go out of our way to be kind toward people of different backgrounds but lack a fuller understanding of our (and our institution's) privileges and implicit biases – and how to truly confront them as an advocate. Some of us, like the aravah/ willow, simply don't know where to start at all.

And yet, despite all these differences, each of us has something to offer.

The lulavim among us can learn how to put our knowledge into action; how to use our wisdom to think outside the box to make our communities more welcoming. The hadassim can learn how to make our impact match our intent by learning, reflecting, and growing in our inclusivity work. The etrogim, even with our knowledge and good deeds, can both teach others and also see our past selves reflected in them. And the aravot among us — those of us who are just beginning our journeys to any form of audacious hospitality work — can both learn from everyone else and remind them that we all had to start somewhere, that we as Jews do not progress by shaming one another but by lifting one another up.



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
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
