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#### **BRINGING RELEVANCE TO TU BISHVAT**

There are four Jewish new years. The first may be fairly obvious to some, Rosh HaShanah, literally "the head of the year." The others less so, and their calendar significance has fallen mainly into obscurity over time. We don't pay much attention to them, or at least to the fact that they mark a new cycle of the year. One of them has to do with a tax that we don't really follow anymore, and another is often looped into a popular holiday. I will leave that one out. If you know or find it in a book

or the all-knowing Google, send me an email. I'd like to focus on one that has a very different history than the other three. It started as a popular holiday, fell into obscurity, and then rose again to popularity in recent times. Holidays, you see, only carry significance when we bring them value. The most profound ritual is void without anyone to practice it. The new year I am referring to is one we celebrate around this time of the year, the new year of the trees or Tu Bishvat.

The reason it fell into disuse is simple. Jews celebrated Tu Bishvat widely until our people were exiled from the land of Israel. Without living in the land of Israel, and without land really to call their own, Jews for many generations didn't have the space to plant trees and celebrate their bloom. Jews celebrated the holiday, but the practice had to shift. Instead of planting trees, people celebrated their fruit, blessings offered over tasting the first natural food of the new season. Still today we celebrate different kinds of fruit, and many will find some new fruit they haven't tried in a while so that they can say the shehecheyanu over the new experience. In our house, Dori and I usually scout out a dragonfruit or some rare tropical delight. Back in California, I picture us looking around for what is growing in our neighborhood. This land is so much like the land of Israel, fruits spilling out over fences, pomegranates bursting with seeds right on the branch. Southern California is known as a Mediterranean climate, our own little golden promised land.

Back to the history, Tu Bishvat was sparsely celebrated until the kabbalists got a hold of it. This innovative, creative, and deeply spiritual group from the 16th century brought several new things to our tradition and breathed all kinds of life into our ancient practice, among them much of our Friday night experience. They brought mystical significance to Tu Bishvat, adding a seder to the holiday complete with parallels to the four worlds of the kabbalah (more on that another time). This brought back this holiday somewhat but it still didn't completely regain widespread practice until the 20th century, and that's for two reasons.

The first is also reasonably simple, Jews returned to the land of Israel. Again people could celebrate the planting of trees in that ancient land, and it became a theme of the Zionist movement to

repopulate the modern state with trees.

The second is less obvious, and that is that we began to learn more about our natural world. We started to find out that our living was making significant negative impacts on the world around us. We learned that our world is fragile and our living in it is with a delicate balance. Our tradition has always had a strong connection to the earth and so the environmental movement captured our people's hearts. It was only a matter of time before we began to find seeds for that marriage between Judaism and Environmentalism in our holidays. On Sukkot we build and live outside, on Shabbat we describe the canopy of the stars and our fragile earth, and lo and behold, there is an entire holiday just to celebrate trees.

I think that what rises and falls in practice shares where the heart of a community is, and so it is significant that we again celebrate Tu Bishvat as a Jewish People. Not only is our impact more evident now with the advent of new instruments that measure carbon levels and global temperatures, but we seem to need to return to our natural world. Especially now, when so much of our life is conducted online, I invite us to take this holiday as an invitation and perhaps even expand its practice. Enjoy our beautiful and bountiful world, and find yourself outside drinking in the sun and tasting the fresh and sweet air like a new fruit in your mouth. *Shehecheyanu*.

#### A PERFECT STORM

The phrase "A Perfect Storm," is often used to describe a series of events that occur at the same time causing significant damage as a result of the confluence of events. Right now, it feels like we are in the middle of a perfect storm. With the current surge of virus infections, hospitals and health care workers being taxed to the point of being unable to properly care for those in need, and death totals far exceeding all expectations, our world is

in complete turmoil.

What I've just described is only one piece (albeit a significant part) of the storm. The criminal and despicable behavior that occurred at our nation's capital on January 6 make up another piece of the perfect storm. Please note that this article has nothing to do with politics. I'm talking about common decency here. Doing what was done that day is not partisan. Nor was it legitimate protest. It was criminal, plain and simple.

The first amendment of our Constitution guarantees the right to assemble. It does not allow for physical violence, property damage, or extortion. The fact that this happened at the same time we are all trying to stay safe and remain healthy is what's making up the perfect storm. The anxiety that many of us were feeling prior to that day was only exacerbated by the horrifying visuals of our democracy being attacked.

That's the bad news. The good news is we have a place. A place that allows us to take a deep breath, let our shoulders sag, and forget about the world, at least for a short time, until we have to get back to reality. The place I'm talking about is at the corner of 3rd and Loma in Long Beach. The word *sanctuary* describes a room in our synagogue that is used for engaging in religious worship. The word also, however, describes what we can find as members of our Temple Israel community.

I remember, as do all of us of course, the horrific day in September of 2001, when the unthinkable happened, and we were left gaping at the images on our televisions, images that nobody could have ever imagined.

That evening, a group of my neighbors gathered outside, and started singing God Bless America, as well as other patriotic songs. We held hands, formed circles and shed tears while at the same time providing each other with comfort. That comfort came from the fact that we were all Americans and were in this together.

Unfortunately, our current perfect storm prevents us from gathering as we would like. It prevents us from the physical closeness that we crave, and the ability to look into each other's eyes with compassion, understanding and connection.

Those are things we cannot do. What we can do is remember we are all part of an amazing community, a community based on mutual respect, as well as a shared heritage, shared culture, and most importantly, a shared love for our synagogue.

It is at a time such as this when we need each other more than ever. I strongly encourage you to attend a Shabbat or Havdalah service. There are also so many other opportunities to be together, even virtually. The calendar of events is emailed out every week on Mondays and Fridays. I assure you there is something for everyone. All you have to do is look.

One of the definitions of family is, "a group of persons connected by a collective social, or other commonality."

At Temple Israel, we are a family. And when a perfect storm hits, our family is who we turn to for comfort and support. That's what we are here for.

# NEXT 100 YEARS CAMPAIGN INTERVIEW WITH RON & SYLVIA HARTMAN



Amy: Hi Sylvia and Ron. I am so excited to interview you and learn more about both of you. You are major contributors to Temple Israel's Next 100 Years Campaign through your recent \$500,000 cash gift. We are so appreciative of your support. Your donation has made a difference for the present and

Amy: Tell me about your history and connection to Temple Israel? Sylvia: We moved to California from New York for Ron to work for one year when Carl was four and Bruce was one. We never left. Gregg is an orthopedic surgeon and lives in Simi Valley. Glenn lives in New Orleans and works as a musician. He plays with the New Orleans Klezmer All-Stars. We connect on Shabbat by sending each other photos of our Shabbat candles and exchanging phone calls.

Amy: Why is the continuity of Temple Israel important to you? Ron: My father founded his synagogue in Queens, New York. It was a Conservative Synagogue. I had a strong example of involvement and philanthropy.

*Sylvia*: I grew up in a more modern Jewish home and was self-taught. I am more spiritual now. We connect with our Judaism through our kids and grandkids as well.

Amy: What excites you about what is going on at Temple Israel? Sylvia: I have attended Torah Study and enjoyed it. I have also enjoyed being able to join in on Zoom even though we are currently in Idaho.

- Service: Serving on at least one committee with the goal of chairing a committee or sub-committee within two years of board membership.
- Greeting: Acting as a greeter and/or Board Representative at Services a minimum of four times per year and at the High Holy Days.
- Support: Staying current with all personal financial commitments to Temple Israel.
- Fund Raising: Actively support fund-raising events of the Temple.

#### **PIKUACH NEFESH - TO SAVE A LIFE**

Rabbi Geoffrey Mitelman, writing about science and religion for the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), wrote: "...some people think of science and religion as being inherently in conflict, I think it's because they tend to define "religion" as "blind acceptance and complete certainty about silly, superstitious fantasies." Quite honestly, if that's what religion really was, I wouldn't be religious! In fact, it's not "religion" in general, but that particular definition of religion that is so often in conflict with science. Instead, my experience with Judaism has been that it embraces science quite easily...religion is about helping people create a deeper sense of meaning and a stronger sense of their values...I truly believe that science and religion can be brought together to improve ourselves, our society and our world."

As public health officials increase the widespread distribution of the vaccines to protect against COVID-19, it might be helpful to discuss what role religious organizations have to play in promotion of this massive public health campaign. Nearly 330 million Americans will need to be vaccinated.

A <u>December 2020 article</u> in Desert News, Utah's oldest continuously published daily newspaper, describes a Rabbi who was thrust into a position as vaccine advocate when some non-Jewish religions raised religious objections to vaccination. Recently Pope Francis said, "It is an ethical duty to take the vaccine, here in the Vatican we will start next week, I am also in line to take it." In December, the Vatican deemed that it was morally acceptable to be vaccinated against COVID-19, after some anti-abortion groups raised concerns about how the vaccines were manufactured. Some had suggested the coronavirus vaccines were made using cells from aborted fetuses. The cells are actually engineered and grown in labs from tissue acquired many decades ago, and are not made directly from aborted fetuses.

The Orthodox Union and Rabbinical Council of America, citing "the Torah obligation to preserve our lives and the lives of others," said "we strongly encourage all those eligible to access the COVID-19 vaccination to do so. We hope and pray that such steps will help bring to an end the tragic toll that the pandemic has taken on our community and beyond."

URJ has a "Judaism Under Quarantine: Helpful Content to Share with Congregants Right Now" information page. Rabbi Jonah Dov Pesner, Director of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, issued a statement on behalf of the Union for Reform Judaism, Central Conference of American Rabbis, and wider Reform movement to promote equitable distribution of COVID-19 vaccines. Advocacy for our most vulnerable populations and social justice advocacy can be a critical role of religion in regards to vaccine rollout.

The <u>National Muslim Task Force</u> on COVID-19 and the National Black Muslim COVID Coalition have jointly recommended receiving the mRNA vaccines "as directed by your physician or healthcare provider based on your risk and local public health

authority guidance." They added: "We understand that some communities distrust the system and have legitimate concerns over vaccines and vaccination protocols. So we recommend healthcare providers engage with minority communities - racial, religious, and otherwise - to address these concerns as the pandemic rages on."

All of us will have a part to play in mitigating the spread of COVID-19. All of us will need to make rational decisions rooted in our moral guidance. All of us will have an opportunity to truly heal our world.

# A NOTE FROM THE CANTOR SEARCH COMMITTEE

As announced last year, Cantor Hass shall be stepping down from her role as Temple Israel's cantor in June 2021. We are truly thankful to Cantor Hass for all she has done for our synagogue during her six-year tenure, and wish her well in new endeavors. A Cantor Search Committee has been formed to find her replacement, working closely with Rabbi Fox and representing the full breadth of our diverse temple community.

The process of finding a new cantor will be similar in many ways to previous Temple Israel clergy searches, in that we shall be conducting interviews with a broad range of highly qualified candidates. However, unlike our recent rabbi search, there is no mandate in the institution's bylaws regarding the hiring of a cantor. Rather than a community-wide vote, the committee shall at the conclusion of its search submit a recommended candidate to the Board of Directors, who will then vote on whether to extend a job offer to that candidate.

Another notable difference between our recent rabbi search and the search for our new cantor is that due to COVID-19, all interviews are being held virtually. In accordance with the American Conference of Cantors (ACC) guidelines for interviewing during the pandemic, we will not be inviting any candidates for in-person interviews or performances; rather, the entire interview process shall be held online.

There will be opportunities for the Temple Israel community at large to express views on what is being sought in our new cantor, and we shall actively keep you informed as to the committee's progress in the months ahead. We are eager to begin the exciting task of installing our newest clergy member, whom in partnership with Rabbi Fox will help assume the evolving musical, spiritual and pastoral needs of Temple Israel's community in 2021 and beyond.

#### **Recipe for Passover Vegetable Kugels**

1/2 cup margarine or butter, melted and slightly cooled

1 cup unpeeled, grated Granny Smith apple

1 cup peeled, grated sweet potato (1 small)

1 cup peeled, grated carrots (about 2)

1 cup matzo meal

1/2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp. grated nutmeg

1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar (can omit)

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Grease muffin tins and set aside (can use mini muffin tins for 18, or regular muffin tins to make 9). In a medium bowl, combine all the ingredients. Divide into muffin tins. Cover with parchment followed by aluminum foil. Bake 30 minutes. Increase oven temperature to 350 degrees. Remove paper and foil and continue cooking until firm and golden brown, about 10 minutes more. Enjoy!

# KOL M'YISRAEL / A VOICE FROM ISRAEL THE BUBBLE

As many of you may have noticed by my multipart introduction, while I am a staunch Zionist and love Israel, my life and experience here center around Tel Aviv - a distinction necessary to make. Why? To the Israeli, Tel Aviv is an island of sex, nightclubs, drugs, immodesty, beach bums, leftist values, and hedonistic living in an otherwise decent Jewish country. To the Tel Avivi, the world ends at the walls to the city. These walls might be metaphorical,

but they are also quite physical: to the north lies the HaYarkon River and the park upon its banks (one of the hidden gems of the city, and an urban nature retreat for the Tel Avivi); to the east cuts the Ayalon River with the nation's central railway and Israel's only real urban freeway paving its banks; and to the south is Shalma Road, the most dramatic example of just how real the walls are. On the Tel Aviv side mid-rises squeeze in as dense as possible while on the opposite side (still technically within the city limits) virtual nothingness; here the wall is easiest to imagine, as the buildings look truly crowded behind a medieval fortification. The truest of Tel Avivi has no known incentive to cross these limits. Most only will do so to visit family for Shabbat dinners or to make it to Ben Gurion Airport. The unlucky ones, which include myself, have to make the journey daily as part of our commute.

This barrier between the metropolis and its hinterlands is given, appropriately, a more ephemeral and nonchalant term: the Bubble. In a worrying country, Tel Avivis live untroubled. Somehow, when the rest of the country is under red alert from rocket attack, no alarms sound here. It's even said to rain less in Tel Aviv. So when it comes time to leave, the Bubble can feel more like a force field. First as you head outward for your journey, the idyllic streets of the city center open into wide thoroughfares. The car traffic and adjoining noise soars. Any escape to side streets ends as they terminate and funnel back onto the thoroughfares, the superblocks of the army headquarters, the shopping malls, the central bus stations, and museums filling in the space. The weight and the shadows of the sentinel skyscrapers, shoulderto-shoulder along the Ayalon, impose down upon you, trying to physically repel you back towards the refuge of the city. Their message has time to sink in as you suffer the traffic resulting from seemingly every person in the country jamming HaShalom interchange - its tunnels and bridges and roads full. Infinite buses and taxis endlessly vie to inch ahead of one another. The scooters seep through any crack left between then. If somehow you willed yourself through all this, you did it. You left Tel Aviv. Now you can say that you have entered Israel.



We pray for our elected public servants in this moment, that their lives be safe and that they have the courage to act with integrity and moral conscience. We pray also for those who took part in the violent actions in our Capitol and for those who have willingly sanctioned and supported those acts. We pray that somehow, we may reach them and connect with a vision of our common humanity and shared future. We pray for our betterment as a nation that we strive, not to be the most powerful nation, but to be the most fair, the most equitable, the most compassionate. May we commit together to the building of that "more perfect union. Love, Interfaith Movement for Human Integrity."



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


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
