PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE / RITUAL PRACTICE MESSAGE



PEW?

How do we look at the future and remain strong and vital? The Pew Research Center recently released its 250 page report, the latest since 2013, on the state of Judaism in America. This report is based on responses from 4718 Jewish people, November 2019 – June 2020. It is worth mentioning highlights and discussing the implications for our future.

Some of the highlights:

- In the 18-25 year age group, 15% identify as non-Hispanic white.
- Reform Jews are 80% Democrat and 18% Republican, while Orthodox are 75% Republican and 20% Democrat.
- 82% of Jews say that Israel is essential or important in the meaning of being Jewish.
- Only 9% of Orthodox say they have a lot in common with Reform Jews and Reform Jews say the same about Orthodox.
- 47% of non-Orthodox Jews are married to someone not Jewish. In marriages since 2010, the number went up to 61%.
- 37% of Reform Jews belong to a synagogue though 63% of those who identify as Reform do not belong to a synagogue.
- Working for justice and equality is a large priority.

Just even these few highlights have many implications. 1.) If people identify as Reform but don't belong to a synagogue, how are they living their Reform Jewish lives? Do they belong to other organizations? How do we reach out and ask them what role a would synagogue have in their lives? What would they want in a synagogue? 2.) If the future is >50% intermarriage, how do we not only welcome these entire families, but truly make them feel like they belong? The same with anyone who is non-Hispanic white. 3.) Given the difference in political party preference, how does the liberal Reform movement open itself to listen to / dialogue with, and welcome more politically conservative Jews? 4.) How do the different movements in Judaism reach out to each other to understand and accept each other? What can we do together? What does it mean for the Jewish People if we keep dividing? 5.) How do we elevate non-political social justice activities based on **Iewish values?**

There is so much more in the report. Clearly these are the bare minimum highlights of this snapshot of Jewish life in the United States. It is up to us to use this data to inform us and act and plan accordingly. To paraphrase Amy Asin from the URJ: How can we be not just welcoming, but make people feel like they really belong? She also emphasizes that we must look at what ties us all together and recognize the different ways that we may live a Jewish life. THE JEWISH CONNECTION TO CHRISTMAS MUSIC

As I sit here writing this article, it is late October, and it's a crisp fall day. By crisp, I mean in the mid-70s. I'm even wearing a sweater! The High Holy Days have passed, and like clockwork, before Thanksgiving has even arrived, I am seeing Christmas trees and strings of lights popping up in stores and around my neighborhood. Before long, the sounds of the holidays will be upon us: Christmas music. But before you ask yourself why the Cantor is

discussing Christmas music, let me explain. Much of the secular music of the holiday was written by, you guessed it, Jews. In fact, Jewish immigrants were among some of the first to write non-religious Christmas music. Why? Because they longed to assimilate and be considered American. In writing this music, they were showing the world that they were part of the greater, surrounding culture, and they demonstrated their patriotism. By doing so, they created the sound that we associate with Christmas. Jewish music has been described as music written by Jews, for Jews, or about Jews, which means that much of the secular Christmas music we hear during the holidays is actually Jewish music.

Let's start with "White Christmas." One of the most popular Christmas tunes, it was written by Irving Berlin in 1941 and later featured in the movie Holiday Inn where it was crooned by Bing Crosby. Berlin was a Russian Jew whose family moved to America when he was five to escape persecution. Berlin loved this country and was extremely patriotic. He was the composer of "God Bless America", and 'White Christmas" was another way for him to show his patriotism and gratitude towards America. "White Christmas" was the one of the first popular secular Christmas songs written, and its popularity paved the way for other composers to find success using nostalgic, secular themes.

"Chestnuts Roasting on an Open Fire" was written by Mel Torme and Robert Wells, both Jewish. Mel Torme, like Berlin, was the son of Russian Jewish immigrants. He said in an interview that he wrote this song while trying to cool down during a heat wave. The iconic "Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer" was written by Johnny Marks who based it on a story written by his brother-in-law, Robert May. They were both Jewish. Marks clearly knew that Christmas songs were his key to success; he also wrote "Run Rudolph Run," "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree," "A Holly Jolly Christmas," and "Silver and Gold."

Sammy Cahn (born Samuel Cohen), had great success re-writing the Yiddish song "Bei Mir Bistu Shein" with English lyrics for the Andrew Sisters. He changed the title to "Bei Mir Bist du Schon" to make it sound less Yiddish and more Germanic. The original

song was written by Jacob Jacobs and Sholom Secunda for the Yiddish theater. Cahn went on to write the hit "Let It Snow" with Jule Styne, also Jewish. Like Torme, Cahn said he wrote this song to cool down during a heat wave. Listen carefully to the lyrics...it never mentions Christmas, yet it has become a beloved Christmas tune. Other Jewish songwriting duos include: Edward Pola and George Wyle who co-wrote "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year" and Jay Livingston and Ray Evans who co-wrote "Silver Bells." Wyle also co-wrote the theme song to Gilligan's Island. "Winter Wonderland" and "I'll Be Home for Christmas" were each composed by Jews musicians with lyrics by non-Jewish writers.

The Christmas song made famous by Eartha Kitt, "Santa Baby," was written by Jewish composers Joan Javits and Philip Springer. This pair is actually my favorite because I had the honor to work with them. I did an equity showcase of one of their shows while in New York, and I worked with Springer for many years on his new works both in LA and in NYC. He is now in his 90s and still writing and playing piano. Everytime "Santa Baby" plays, I am reminded of him and smile.

Each of these Jewish composers was either born elsewhere and moved to the U.S. to escape antisemitism and persecution, or they were second generation Americans whose parents came to America searching for religious freedom. The music industry was a safe haven for Jews. It was one of the few industries that was not overrun by antisemitism. These composers and lyricists hoped to find a way into mainstream American culture, and writing secular Christmas music was one way for them to assimilate. This music, tinged with nostalgia, echoed their own longing to belong. It was their way to express their patriotism and their gratitude at being able to live a life without persecution. Even though it rarely happens here in Long Beach, I say, "Let it Snow!"




BRANDON BROWN ANDI President

SOCIAL ACTION: A PERSONAL DEFINITION

About a month before Rosh HaShanah this year, I was contacted by Rabbi Miriam Philips, Director of Youth Education and Family Engagement at Temple Bat Yahm in Newport Beach. The temple had plans to host a family day on Rosh HaShanah centered around the children's book "Engineer Ari and the Rosh Hashanah Ride" by Deborah Bodin Cohen and Shahar Kober.

The idea for the day was to have three stations with experts presenting on the three main items and themes contained not only in the book, but also pertinent to Rosh HaShanah. There would be a baker, a beekeeper, and an apple grower. The apple station would be the last stop and each family would be given apples to take home. A self-propelled train would ferry families between stations.

Rabbi Philips went on to acknowledge an awareness of my background from talking to her parents, longtime temple members David and Susan Philips. From them, she was aware that I grew up on a ranch with fruit trees, mostly apples. *Would I be willing to be the apple expert?*

After thinking about it over the weekend, I accepted and immediately began working on my presentation. The hard part was developing a theme. Finally, I settled on "connections". How is the apple grown, harvested, consumed, symbolized, and central to our lives and to Rosh Hashanah?

So I began to sort through research and memories. For example, I discovered that the Ana apple was developed in the Golan Heights of Israel specifically to grow in a more Mediterranean climate like that here in southern California. Also, I remembered spending many long and hot hours in the ranch house kitchen with my family peeling, coring, cutting, and stringing up apple "doughnuts" on the back porch to create dried apples.

I weaved these and many more details into the ten-minute presentation which highlighted how apples were planted, grown, and harvested. I brought two small trees and mature branches to show the life cycle of a tree and about a dozen varieties of apples to display that I purchased from local markets. I also had pictures from the ranch including one of my father planting apple trees.

I mentioned the foods and products that we consume that come from apples: apple juice, apple sauce, dried apples, apple chips, apple wood for smoking foods, and, most importantly, apple pie a la mode!

And of course, the apple's use at Rosh HaShanah; a symbol of good health in the new year and a representation of the earth to be celebrated on its birthday.

At the end of the day, when the last of the 100 families had left my station, I couldn't help thinking that I had participated in a large social action event that brought about change. From the questions, interest, and overall engagement, I realized that both parents and children now more fully understood how they were connected to an apple and to their environment. Through this event, many of the families saw maybe for the first time how flour was made into challah and how bees created honey. Their experience of this day could certainly change their perspectives of many Rosh HaShanahs to come.

As for me, I too learned something that day and clarified my own sense of social action as behavior that creates a change of beliefs or perceptions to strengthen values and relationships. And most importantly, small actions can lead to big changes.

KOL M'YISRAEL / A VOICE FROM ISRAEL

Every so often, you get some truly wacky, only-in-Israel moments. Last month, the forces of this balagan of a country mixed just right to create an event I thought worth sharing.

One Thursday I received a text from a friend that in Sarona Market that evening was an Oktoberfest-themed festival. Sarona is a redeveloped part of the central IDF headquarters. One half is in the style of Chelsea

market, with bougie food vendors located in a large hall under apartment complexes, while the other half is a restored Templar's colony. Founded in the late 1800s, the colony was one of the first by Europeans in Ottoman Palestine. Today this part of the development is distinguished by light-beige stucco houses, standing a few stories tall, dotted on a grid, and interspaced with gardens and walking paths. Instead of agricultural colonists, the houses are occupied by high-end retailers. A pleasant space in the bustling metropolis, its biggest attractions are that it is easily accessible by car and the Whiskey Museum (a personal favorite in the city).

My friends arrived at the event a half-hour earlier than me, sending me intel that there was a short line to enter, because they were checking vaccine certifications. But in the intervening time, the line had grown immensely, stretching from one side of the compound to the other. Now to live in a city, lines cannot be something that phase you, but this line was on the order of magnitude of Disneyland. After a quick observation, I filed in, as the line seemed to be moving quick enough to brave it. In the half hour it took me to get to the check station, I joked to myself that the Israelis, not native to line standing, seemed quite orderly today: I jinxed myself.

Upon arriving at the front, the checkers glanced as quick as humanly possible to see that a Green Pass was on my phone screen, which prompted me forward into a mosh pit standing before the security check. After another 30 minutes of standing in this very tight space, with at least 300 other people (so much for being Corona-safe), a guard announced that they would only let in 50 people, as they were limiting capacity to comply with Green Pass restrictions. By now I was determined to get in, and I could see my friends just past the final gate waiting for me. Months of Israeli-ness training led to this moment: now was the time to leave behind the polite American, forget waiting and patience, embrace balagan, and move relentlessly forward. Even wearing my work backpack, the tiniest gaps became opportunities, and eventually I was on the other side.

Was the grass really greener? Well, the beer festival included a whopping variety of exactly two beers, and I was too line-fatigued to wait in another for the pretzels. The real prize, however, was the entertainment. The feature performers were Red Band, an Israeli puppet rock band. For the next 45 minutes, Muppets rocked out to power ballads sandwiched by some crude humor.






