BALANCE/PATIENCE

One of the issues that I have learned about now more than ever is the need for balance and the need for patience. Our clergy, staff, and lay leaders (including executive committee, board members, committee chairs, and even committee members) are all working very hard at their volunteer work at TI, as well as with their work, families, or a plethora of retirement activities. It is so easy to work almost 24/7, given all the remote ways that we can work and

communicate.

A huge topic in so many professions is that of burn-out. Doctors, clergy, executive directors, teachers, postal workers (!) all grapple with burn-out and finding balance between self-care, while at the same time excelling at their work. Two of the biggest issues to fight burn-out are an organized, friendly work environment, but also in finding balance between work life and life outside of work. Realizing that it is okay to stop working and separate, as well as being allowed to do so, is so important. Family, hobbies, exercise, or just rest/down time are needed to recharge. The better the self-care, the better one will be able to perform at a high level and enjoy their profession.

We need to look at our professionals, our lay leaders, and our loved ones, and allow them regular time to refresh and renew in whatever way works for them. This should not be a sometimes thing, but a regular value built into our daily schedules so we can be the best that we are able. We need to encourage this. We need to prevent burn-out and look for signs of it at an early stage.

I think that emails are a blessing and a curse. They have made it so much easier to communicate. They can be overwhelming though even if all the junk is filtered out. It is difficult to make time every day to go through them all, to read and prioritize, let alone respond. Even more difficult is the time needed to respond thoughtfully. All the other activities of one's job need to be completed, as well as personal life activities... and the emails just keep coming. If emails weren't enough, texting is added to the fray and one begins to wonder when sleep gets worked into the day.

As we struggle for balance in general, the added convenience and burden of these communication tools add another layer that was not here 25 or more years ago. I would ask everyone to look at our clergy, staff, leaders, fellow congregants, and loved ones, and be patient when an email is sent but not answered quickly. The recipient has likely read it, is thinking about it, and maybe even be wanting to talk to others before responding. Let's support each other in the effort to find balance as we strive to be the best we can be and avoid the downfalls of burn out. FINDING INSPIRATION TO LEARN "NEW TRICKS"

I am going through a major transition in my life which has me pondering, "can you really teach an old dog new tricks?" Well, according to Mythbusters (episode 74, March 14, 2007) you can! But somehow, as fun and as interesting as the episode was (almost as fun as one in which they try to herd cats) it wasn't that comforting, since I am not, in fact, an old dog.

So, as any Ritual Practice VP should do, I looked to our texts. The Torah

is full of people undergoing transitions and challenges; many happening late in life and not all happening by choice. Abraham was told to pick and leave his home for a new land. Sarah became a mother at an age most women would be great-grandmothers. Moses had to leave his bucolic life to rescue the Israelites from Egypt. Miriam grows up to be a prophet and leader of women. But while inspiring, the Biblical transitions are much grander in scale than my own "looking for a new job" situation.

While I was still mulling this over, I attended the Adult B'nai Mitzvah service on December 10, here at Temple Israel. It was a truly beautiful service, with each participant leading a prayer, speaking from the heart, and reading from the Torah. In the middle of the service, I realized that I had found my inspiration.

Here were a group of adults who are learned and confident in their fields, who decided to learn something new. And not only did they learn something new, but they learned it in a new language. And if that wasn't challenging enough, after years of study, they stood before their loved ones, friends, and strangers to lead us in prayer. They each spoke very movingly about how their Torah portion related to their lives.

Brené Brown says that vulnerability is made up of uncertainty, risk, and emotional exposure. This definitely describes how I'm feeling as I contemplate the next phase of my life. But with the example of Jill, Kim, Morgan, Darrin, Rachel, Lydia, and Harriett, I'm inspired and encouraged as I push forward.



INTRODUCING OUR NEW FOUNDATIONAL STATEMENTS: MISSION, VISION AND VALUES

I am incredibly pleased and proud to announce that Temple Israel has new Foundational Statements! After 18 months of work, by an incredible task force, the Board of Directors approved the proposed Foundational Statements at the December board meeting.

So, what are Foundational Statements and why are they important?

Every organization needs to define who they are and what their purpose is; their goals, and the core values that guide its members and leaders.

Foundational Statements are more commonly referred to as the Mission, Vision and Values and, for us, are defined as follows:

The **mission statement** is a clear, concise and powerful statement that expresses the reason why we exist or our sacred purpose. With memorable language, it inspires our congregants to support and participate in our community and what we do.

The **vision statement** describes what we will look like when we are living our sacred purpose or mission. Highlighting our hopes and ambitions for the future of our synagogue and congregation, our vision is designed to inspire an imagined future state and assist in the direction of our new strategic plan.

The **values statement** represents our deeply held core beliefs, the higher purpose connected to our mission. Values guide the choices members and leaders make in how we behave and treat others, and in decisions we make as we forward.

For us, as a synagogue, these Foundational Statements not only tell the outside world about who we are and why they might want to be a part of our community but provide a framework for our programming and how expenditures are determined. They are a constant reminder of the values we hold dear and how we interact with each other.

Further, our Foundational Statements reflect this specific moment in time. We used the most recent Mission and Vision Statements, written in 2012, as a starting point. Building on our history and work done by our predecessors, we incorporated the input and suggestions from the many focus groups convened during our rabbinic transition period in 2019. In addition, we compared our ideas with the Foundational Statements of other Reform synagogues.

Much has changed since our last statements were written in 2012. Our congregation is far more diverse, we have been through some tumultuous years, and have embarked on an exciting time with new leadership, a new Rabbi and Cantor! We are also in the process of defining how we will operate as we reopen our building after almost 2 years and are preparing to begin new strategic planning. The timing is perfect for adopting these new statements!

SOCIAL ACTION / A VOICE FROM ISRAEL

As the secular new year begins, now is a good time to furnish a report of the actions and activities that the Social Action Committee was engaged in during 2021.

Organizations benefiting from congregational donations of either time, money or goods: Catholic Outreach in Action, Care Closet, CityHeart, DAYS Long Beach, East Village Food Bank, Grey Panthers, Habitat for Humanity, Long Beach Center for Economic Inclusion, Long Beach Community Table, Long Beach Community College Viking Food Pantry, JFCS Food Pantry, St Luke's Episcopal Church, Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice, We Care, Wrap the Kids

Events that took place in 2021 via Zoom, at Temple Israel, or in the Long Beach Community:

- A ceremonial wall raising ceremony was conducted at the 14th Pine/Pacific Habitat for Humanity Long Beach site
- A Workers' Justice Seder was held in conjunction with Clergy and Laity United for Economic Justice, and South Coast Interfaith Council featuring Rabbi Scott Fox and Cantor Sara Hass from Temple Israel, Rabbi Neil Comess-Daniels from Temple Beth Shir Shalom in Santa Monica, and Rabbi Cassi Kail from Temple Beth El in San Pedro. Representatives from the Long Beach Port truck drivers and Kroger grocery employees discussed the issues facing them and others in their professions
- The committee helped host the Lapid Shapiro Scholar-in-Residence featuring Rabbi Lee Bycel, which focused on refugees in America. Committee members provided handouts with opportunities for action by participants to compliment the issues presented in the study session and discussion
- Some 30 Temple Israel members and friends marched behind a Temple Israel banner at the Women's Reproductive Rights March held in downtown Long Beach
- Several drive-by, drop-off drives were held during 2021. The High Holy Days Food Drive netted about 250 bags of food picked up by JFCS Food Pantry and Long Beach City College Viking Food Pantry
- 75 hygiene kits were assembled and delivered to We Care and CityHeart, while the cold weather clothing went to the Grey Panthers specifically to assist senior citizens
- A Hanukkah presentation was given to congregants at the Los Altos United Methodist Church featuring reading of the Hanukkah story, the history and meaning of the menorah and dreidel, live music, sing-alongs, and fresh latkes

Opportunities for congregational engagement

And finally, a Social Action section has been added to the congregational emails published on Mondays to post opportunities for individual actions by congregants.

Thanks to all, including committee members, volunteers, congregants, TI staff and clergy, who donated time, money or goods to make the events of 2021 so successful.

KOL <u>M</u>'YISRAEL / A VOICE <u>FROM</u> ISRAEL





These next few months, my entry will be dedicated to a person who has singularly shaped my journey here in Israel. The timing is only fitting since I am writing close to our twoyear anniversary together. Etay Hiba is the man who captured my heart. Unfortunately, I cannot gossip here with juicy stories of the Tel Avivian dating world (well I could from many second-hand stories), because my arrival at his doorstep was not so long

after my own arrival in Israel. I can, however, intimate a love story between one American and one Israeli, and to describe, in the general sense, who is the Israeli partner.

Who is he? Well to begin with, his family is itself a product of a cross-cultural love, between an Ashkenazi heiress and a Mizrachi refugee from Iraq. His mother is the daughter to the townfounder (of a suburb north of Haifa), diplomat, and Nobel Prize nominee. His father fled Iraq during the expulsion of the Jews from the Arab world after Israel's independence and landed here knowing only Arabic. In those days, the idea of intermarriage was especially taboo, as the sabra Ashkenazim were not so welcoming to the Mizrachi and Sephardic newcomers. His paternal grandfather initially disapproved of the union, saying that the civilized Ashkenazim should not marry with the barbaric Mizrachim. After an infamous game of chess, Etay's grandfather, about to be checkmated, flung the board across the room, and, embarrassed by his own lack of civilizing grace, was forced to acquiesce and approve the relationship. (Today, over 25% of Israeli children are born in mixed households.) Together, Miriam and Moshiko raised a religious family of five (of which Etay is the youngest), and rose to lead prestigious careers at Machon Raphael, a defense technology contractor for the IDF.

Our own journey together began in front of the lion statue, where I was standing. Down the alley came running this man, who invited me in for a coffee. Entering the apartment, with him standing on the inside of the door, and me not yet entered, he turned around and hugged me. It was a hug of reassurance and of seeing to this kidnapped tourist. From there I stepped over the doorsill. Looking around the flat, it was clearly the flat of a bachelor, well cleaned but with some clothes strewn in corners on the floor. Proudly, as the centerpiece of the living room, stood a white piano. On the wall were many photos of him, his sister, and her children. There were also a few of him and a couple exes. The bookshelf was crammed full of work papers. In the corner, yoga mats were rolled-up. In the kitchen, coffee was served from a Chemex glass pour-over. Piled were cookbooks of many different cuisines. It could be said the two halves of his upbringing came together so as to allow his history to repeat itself, and here in this apartment, were the building blocks to allow that journey to begin.
