I have just returned from the Jewish Long Beach/JCC trip to Italy and Israel.

In Rome approximately 1,200 Jews were rounded up and sent to their death. They were tricked after collecting 50 kg of gold which was taken as a promise of no deportation. 16 Italian Jews returned. (Let alone remembering who was responsible for the fall of the second temple)

Going to the Kotel, the Western Wall,

on Friday night is an experience not to be missed. It is Kabbalat Shabbat – celebrating Shabbat. There is outrageous celebrating and a cacophony of noise. Orthodox Jews from various origins wearing different hats are praying dancing and singing. Men in suits are dancing and singing. Guys with piercings and tattoos are dancing and singing – arm and arm with the orthodox. It is Shabbat, our weekly holiday. We are all Jews together celebrating being Jewish in our homeland – all coexisting and exuberant.

In Tel Aviv the Peres Center for Peace and Innovation overlooks the Mediterranean in a beautiful work of architecture. Displays take you through different stories of Jewish people of different ages and from all over the world settling in Israel, making their ideas into reality. These are innovations later shared with the world in technology, agriculture, medicine, and so much more.

On Nahalat Benyamin in Tel Aviv 20 and 30 somethings are meeting at cafes and bars. These young adults are the vibrant future of the country working in tech and other exciting fields. While in Modi'in, in the center of the country between Tel Aviv and Jerusalem, founded where the first Channukah story took place, young families are thriving in an ultimate planned community.

Kibbutzim still survive and are started. These are collective societies where all are treated equal, are cared for and all is shared. These are not just your stereotypical farming Kibbutz of buff Jews working in the fields but where wine making, milk producing, and turkeys are the products of the day. There is even an urban Kibbutz of educators living in the city in one apartment building.

The banana industry of Israel is thriving with agricultural innovations that allow Israel to supply itself with its own bananas.

In Rome, nearing the last year of WWII 1,200 Jews were deported and only 16 returned.

Israel, a world leader, and our homeland! I cried thinking about my trip. I cried at the wall. I tear up as I write this. Support the homeland of our people. Visit the homeland of our people. JOIN TEMPLE ISRAEL IN SUMMER OF 2024 AS WE VISIT ISRAEL AS A CULMINATING EVENT OF OUR 100 YEAR ANNIVERSARY. Israel – a physical place existing also in an alternative spiritual space...

RPC MESSAGE

As I'm writing this, the days are almost at their shortest length. It is dark when I wake up in the morning and dark when most people get home from work. It is not surprising that many winter holidays incorporate some kind of celebration of light to offset the long nights. Light has been an important physical and metaphorical image in Judaism.

Rabbi Yehudah Leib Alter of Ger (1847-1905) said in his Sefat Emet:

"Especially at this season, when lights were miraculously lit for Israel even though they did not have enough oil, there remains light even now to help us, with the aid of these Hanukkah candles, to find that hidden light within." The Hanukkah candles are a spiritual symbol; the light of the commandments by which we search out our inner selves. We seek out the hidden divine light within ourselves; the mitzvot are light-seeking candles, instruments given to us to aid us in that search."

(Proverbs 6:23) For the commandment is a lamp, the Torah is a light. Siddur ha-Rav explains this saying, "Torah is called light because it represents the divine flow from above. The mitsvah is a candle, a vessel to contain that light...Through the physical act of fulfilling the commandment, the corporeal comes to be included within the spiritual, raising it up to the highest rung." The ark in our TI sanctuary says

מִצְוָת יְהֹוֶה בְּרָה מְאִירָת עֵינְיִם:

The Mitzvah of Adonai is true, it enlightens the eyes"

Indeed, the very first words we hear God say are, "Let there be light." Before there was a heaven or earth, we had light. This was also the first thing which God declared, "good." And in these long nights, I have to agree.



KOL M'YISRAEL / A VOICE FROM ISRAEL

While Hanukkah is considered a more minor holiday in Israel, it, of course, does not mean it is an insignificant one. Hanukkah lights have not caught on here yet, but instead colossal Hanukkiahs adorn public buildings, synagogues, and streets. In the office and at home people gather for candle lightings and to eat sufganiyot. And entering any bakery means being transported to a sea of jelly donuts and the most artistically allowed

expressions of that word. If you're looking for the best, though, go straight to the traditional, religious baker and take the powdered sugar and glow-in-the-dark strawberry ones.

As a side note, as the homeland of Jesus, there are many great Christmas celebrations and festivities worthy of the attention of any tourist in places like Nazareth, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and Haifa.

While all this Jewishness in the Jewish homeland is a thing that all world Jewry can take pride in, as a oleh hadash the reality becomes more nuanced. Connected to every aspect of the religion is a web of traditions and rituals, and while in a basic sense these are shared worldwide, in the fine grain many variations become evident. In prayer services the written words are the same, but the tunes and rhythms are completely different. Even though I am learning Hebrew, the melodies from childhood and bar mitzvah are still the essence of the prayers in my heart. As a not overly religious guy, this experience is more out of the everyday for me, but with Hanukkah recently, I re-experienced these feelings sometimes in very surprising ways. The first moments began when someone asked me about "levivot and sevivonim." Their face showed shock that a Jew would not know about these things. After some explanation from them, I exclaimed, "Oh, you mean latkes and dreidels!" Later at the office during the Hanukkah happy hour, I saw some dreidels and gelt laying on the table and joked that if on "shin" you "put one in," what do you do for "peh?" (Israeli dreidels replace the shin, meaning there, for peh, meaning here.) This again led to confusion and me learning that the dreidel game is much rarer here. Finally, it was time to eat some latkes-or excuse me, levivot-but when I looked at the table, my excitement became lessened. Many dishes of tzatziki and tahini sat beside the laktes. The sour cream and applesauce that I was so eager to accompany my fried delicacies in the perfect combination of hot and cold and sweet, sour, and savory, however, were absent. Repeat the two stories above and me very sadly eating a dry latkes. I made sure to prepare a proper setting at home, and my boyfriend agreed that here at least Americans had figured something out. By the end of the holidays this year I formulated the realization that as a Diaspora Jew, I will be forever doomed to not fully be in the majority, always needing to graciously explain my customs and share my traditions.


THIS MONTH'S BAT MITZVAH

Climate and Us: Starting Small, Aiming High

Our Temple Israel Foundational Statement says that we are guided by Reform Jewish values to engage in a journey of prayer, learning, and community that inspires us to transform ourselves and the world. Additionally, we value sustainability and Tikkun Olam, the repair of the world.

The new Social Action Climate Tzedek Committee is launching a battery recycling project starting in January and we will be making it easy for everyone to participate!

Americans purchase billions of batteries every year to power just about everything and when they no longer hold their charge, they need to be recycled –In California, it's the law. California is the ONLY state where it is illegal to put any battery in your trash or your curbside recycling. All batteries need to be taken to a separate location for recycling.

Why? Because batteries are hazardous waste. Recycling batteries keeps toxic materials, such as mercury, lead, cadmium, nickel, silver, cobalt, lithium, or graphite out of our landfills – and our groundwater. Many of these materials are finite and valuable, and many can be reused. So, recycling batteries serves the dual purpose of preserving finite resources and protecting the environment.

According to Call2Recycle — which runs the United States' largest battery recycling program — battery recycling was up to 11% in 2020 with 8.4 million pounds of consumer batteries recycled. We can do better!

Temple Israel will be collecting:

Single-use Batteries: Standard single-use batteries are mainly Alkaline and include AA, AAA, C, D, 9-volt, 6-volt, and so forth. They power the household electronics you use every day, such as the TV remote control, toys, flashlights, and so much more and are cheaper and most prevalent. Unfortunately, single-use batteries are generally considered more wasteful because we use them up and then throw them away when the power is depleted. And because they're not rechargeable, we need to always have extra batteries around in case the battery powering an essential gadget dies. There are few locations that take and recycle single-use batteries. Button cell batteries are the flat, round batteries that power small items like watches, car keyless entry remotes, hearing aids, and fitness trackers. These batteries are a limited valuable resource and can be hazardous if not handled properly.

We are not collecting:

Rechargeable Batteries: Because rechargeable batteries can be used over and over. However, they also contain a lot of heavy metals which are in demand. They are recyclable and there are many locations that take them.. Retailers such as AT&T, Best Buy, Black & Decker, DeWalt, Home Depot, Interstate All Battery Centers, Lowe's, Milwaukee Electrical Tool, Office Depot, Orchard Supply, Porter Cable Service Centers, Remington Product Company, Staples, Target, and Verizon Wireless all offer some sort of rechargeable battery recycling program. Cellphones, laptops, and other portable electronics contain lithium-ion rechargeable batteries which are recyclable, and the metal content of these batteries can be recovered in the recycling process. Frequently, these types of batteries can be refurbished and reused and should never be sent to a landfill because they have the potential to overheat and explode when exposed to hot temperatures or compressed. You will more than likely dispose of a Li-ion battery along with an electronic device, such as when you trade in your cellphone or upgrade a laptop or at a community E-waste event or center.

Temple Israel's Battery Recycling Project:

1. Look for container in our foyer.

2. At this time we are collecting Single Use Alkaline and Button Cell Batteries ONLY. 9-volt batteries should have tape covering the 2 poles on the top of the battery.

3. Bring your single use batteries and drop them in our container. Ask your children to help collect and recycle them with you! We will take care of bringing them to the proper site for recycling.

We believe that we can successfully reduce our impact on our planet by using less, reusing and recycling more, and constantly making small improvements through daily decisions at home, while shopping, at work, and at play.




MUSSAR STUDY GROUP
