PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



LOOKING BACK, GOING FORWARD By Jerry Levy, Temple President



It is hard to believe that two years of my Presidency have passed so quickly. When I was asked to take on this role, my thoughts were first 'can I do this job?' and secondly, like my medical oath: 'Do no harm!' My decision was made easier when I considered that we have four great senior staff, financially we are stable, and the next president would have a once in century opportunity to be President during our 100-Year Anniversary!

As I review the last two years, it is amazing at what WE have accomplished together. The 100 - year anniversary featured a number of dedicated programs including a very successful gala, special programs throughout the anniversary year, and the publication of the history of Temple Israel in *Centennial by the Sea*. The Next 100 Years Campaign exceeded our original expectations, both in cash and legacy commitments giving the next 100 years a great start.

In the last two years, our membership has increased by 55 families, and our teen program continues to be the envy of the nation. Our Torah Center continues to thrive, unlike many in congregations around the country that are struggling. The Joys of Jewish Learning featured a wide variety of great programs, including nationally recognized speakers. On the spiritual side, we now have monthly Torah Study in El Dorado Park followed by a meditation walk at the Nature Center, and for services on the second Friday, we enjoy Kol HaNeshama with music in the round.

Some changes are less obvious but no less important. There are significant upgrades to the security for the Temple including rapid doors locks, higher fencing around the perimeter, motion sensing lights in the front of the building and improved campus wide PA system. Our Audio-Visual system has been brought into the 21st century thanks to a generous grant from one of our member families. For those of you who work in the kitchen, you will notice a significant improvement in the temperature thanks to a ventilation system that pushes the heat outside. The Temple's website now features a more user-friendly calendar to help you plan which of the Temple offerings you wish to attend.

Not everything has been milk and honey. My 'honeymoon' ended on October 7, 2023, with echoes of that day reverberating ever since. To remind us of the hostages that are still in captivity, we continue to light a blue candle in addition to the normal Friday night candles. Every Sunday since the beginning of the crisis, Mark Dressner has been leading Run for Their Lives and will continue to do so until all the hostages are home. Other ongoing projects include implementation of the Strategic Plan and asking all of our members to sign up for ShulCloud. The ShulCloud program will help both our members and the office with data, billing, membership, enhanced communication, and includes a member's only section for a membership directory, tracking yahrzeit and much more. If you have not signed up yet, please call the office to guide you through the process.

It has been a distinct honor and privilege to serve as your Temple President for the last two years. I would like to thank everyone who helped me 'do' the job as President, starting with the Senior Staff and extending to the Board, the Office, the Custodial staffs, and finally to you, the members of our congregation.

I leave this office knowing that the state of our Temple is "excellent." I also know that we are in good hands going forward as I 'pass the gavel' to Ron Artstein. Please give him a little time to get comfortable in the job and say yes when he asks for your help!

RITUAL PRACTICES COMMITTEE MESSAGE By Ron Artstein, VP Ritual Practices



How does God feel about the war in Gaza? I don't usually concern myself with questions about God, but I recently came across this question from the perspective of Dr. Moshe Lavee, a kippah-wearing (Orthodox) lecturer of Talmud at the University of Haifa (disclosure: I knew Lavee many years ago, during our military service). Lavee was demonstrating against the war in Gaza while holding a sign saying "Every child is innocent", when he was confronted by Mor Shaal, a digital artist. Here are a few excerpts from their conversation, sharing thoughts about God, the war, and how Israel are being tested at this time.

Mor Shaal: Say, the kippah that you have on your head, are you not ashamed to [wear] it?

Dr. Moshe Lavee: I'm ashamed of you. I'm ashamed that the people of Israel have fallen so much, and are doing such bad things. It grieves me so much.

Shaal: Do you believe in God? Is God happy that you're standing there, bemoaning the Nakba? They want you dead.

Lavee: I am convinced that the Holy One of Blessing sheds a tear when He sees how the People of Israel have fallen, and how we reached a place where we failed the test that the Holy One has put us in through Hamas. ... We failed by falling into a war in which we have already killed fifteen to eighteen thousand children.

Lavee: With the help of Hashem, may He be of blessing, we will be able to show here all the verses which were hung in my school when I was a child, and which are no longer hung in your school. ... Can I quote a few verses from the Tanakh?

Shaal: Please.

Lavee: The wolf shall dwell with the lamb, The leopard lie down with the kid [Isaiah 11:6]. And they shall beat their swords into plowshares, They shall never again know war [Isaiah 2:4]. Be of the disciples of Aaron, loving peace and pursuing peace, loving humankind and drawing them close to the Torah [Pirkei Avot 1:12].

Shaal: You shall blot out the memory of Amalek [Deuteronomy 25:19], do you know that?

Lavee: What did our sages say about blotting out the memory of Amalek? ...

Our sages knew well that the Holy One sometimes puts us to test. And we need to know how to handle the tests that the Holy One puts us through. And that's why they said, Sanheriv has long since come up and mingled all the nations [Mishnah Yadayim 4:4]. You can't tell who is Amalek and who isn't. That's what is said in the Talmud.

Lavee: Now I initiated this demonstration, not them. This demonstration started from a demonstration of people...

Shaal: Oh really. And you are a lecturer at the university?

Lavee: Of course. Because I am in favor of stopping the war. And I am allowed to be in favor of stopping the war. And it is my religious obligation, as a religious person, to be in favor of stopping the war.

FINDING HOME, FINDING HOLINESS By Student Rabbi Sheri Sinaga



It was at the Cheesecake Factory, of all places, that I uttered words I had kept buried deep for years. Sitting across from my Christian pastor, I said quietly, "I'm a lesbian." His face fell. The dismay was clear. I followed with what felt like a breath of liberation: "I want to come out and be my full, authentic self."

What followed was a three-hour conversation filled with sadness, pleading, and policy. He reminded me of the church's anti-LGBTQIA+ stance that I could no longer be a leader on the executive board, or teach weekly Sabbath School, or stand on the bimah to play the piano or lead the choir. "Please reconsider," he said. "You can just stay quiet about your identity—as long as you remain single and celibate."

In that moment, I realized I had to choose between conformity and authenticity. With trembling but resolute faith, I resigned from all my roles. I walked away from a community I had known my entire life, heartbroken but free.

Five years later, I found myself in an "Introduction to Judaism" class with Rabbi Moskowitz at Temple Israel. I had no intention of converting—I was simply curious. But week after week, something began to grow inside me. Seeds of Torah, of welcome, of ancient wisdom and spiritual honesty began to take root. One day in class, without planning it, I blurted out: "I am a lesbian."

I braced myself for rejection—but instead, the class smiled. Some even clapped. In that moment, I felt something profound: acceptance, belonging, and above all, home. A home that affirmed all of who I am.

That sense of affirmation is not new to Judaism—it is, in fact, woven into the fabric of our tradition. While many assume that gender diversity is a modern idea, our sages spoke of more than two genders nearly two thousand years ago.

In the Mishnah and Talmud, our rabbis identified six gender identities—not as an act of modern liberalism, but out of a sincere effort to apply Torah law to the diversity of human experience. They named:

1. Zachar – Male

The typical term for someone assigned male at birth, with male anatomy and social role.

2. Nekeivah – Female

The typical term for someone assigned female at birth, with female anatomy and social role.

3. Androgynos - Androgynous

A person who has both male and female sexual characteristics. Discussed extensively in the Mishnah and Talmud, this person is treated in some laws as male, some as female, and some as a unique category.

4.Tumtum – Obscured or indeterminate sex

A person whose sexual characteristics are indeterminate or obscured (e.g., ambiguous or hidden). The term may describe someone with an unknown biological sex or ambiguous genitalia.

5. Ay'lonit– *Assigned female at birth but doesn't develop female secondary sex characteristics*

Often described as a person assigned female at birth who does not go through puberty or is infertile. Some texts frame this as a woman with a "male-like" body. May have been understood as intersex or a nonbinary expression.

6. Saris – Assigned male at birth but doesn't develop male secondary sex characteristics or is castrated

This term includes two subtypes:

a. Saris adam – one who becomes a saris later in life (e.g., castration or trauma)

b. Saris hamah – born with the condition (i.e., a congenital intersex variation)

These categories were not treated as outliers; they were part of the legal fabric of halakha. The rabbis understood that not all people fit into binary boxes. They might not have used the language we use today—like transgender, intersex, or nonbinary—but their categories reflect a deep awareness that gender diversity is part of God's creation.

In our own time, Reform Judaism has embraced this wisdom and extended it, advocating for LGBTQIA+ dignity and inclusion for over half a century. As early as 1965, the Women of Reform Judaism called for the decriminalization of homosexuality. In 1977, the Union for Reform Jews and Central Conference of American Rabbis, called for equal rights in housing and employment for gay and lesbian individuals. In 2003, the Reform Movement extended its affirmation to bisexual and transgender communities. And today, the work continues.

The Religious Action Center says it beautifully:

600. This is the number the calendar will mark tomorrow, counting the days since Oct 7th. 600 days, and 58 hostages. Currently the situation stands like this: there are no ongoing negotiations. The current candidate for the head of the Shin Bet is quoted as being against any hostage deal and that the war shall be forever. His nomination itself is pushing the country towards a constitutional crises. The government is busy anyways trying to pass a bill that will exempt the ultra Orthodox from being drafted, while concurrently passing out tens of thousands of draft notices to reservists for renewed operations.

I was going to write something about the challenge of building a state based on Jewish values, and how they meet reality. But that picture above, that is the reality. A discussion on values like *tikkun olam, bezelam elohim, and pikuch nefash,* (values that I would consider core to Judaism and even Western civilization) are all just words. The Jewish State, in reality, is not beholden to them. Corruption and zealotry is the reality. History itself is only witness and proof to this, as every independent Jewish state in history collapsed for these exact reasons. Our internal strife always weakened our defenses against outside threats.

Just to be clear, this is not an issue of right or left. All Israeli governments have failed to enact solutions to the problems plaguing the country, many of which elude conclusion since the country's founding. Neither is it a problem just of Israeli Jewry. Around the world, we as a people are choosing hate and fear over our values. We choose fear of being hated as *other* and try to make ourselves as palatable to non-Jews as possible, or we choose fear of other and push supremacy.

It is also hard to say that the situation is out of line with Jewish values. Maybe not values we desire to call our own, but they undeniably find support in the texts of our people too. Wiping out nations so we can claim Israel unfortunately is also part of our history. A bleak picture. And so, what should be done? Should we just throw in the towel and call it a day? Honestly, it does create a lot of doubt, a lot of confusion, and a lot of hardship to find a way forward. Of course I should probably end with some hopeful statement, but 600 days in, it is hard to think of one. The only thing I can say is that we all, as Jews, need to reconnect with our values, and declare them as what will lead our paths forward. It's said that we are the people of the book, and the Torah that keeps us. So let it! A lot of what's in there is harsh, but it also provides paths forward from endless war and hatred. The Patriarchs made peace with their enemies, and the Israelites were commanded to remember the humanity of the Egyptians.





Tikkun Leil Shavuot EMIGRATION STORIES OF RESILIENCE

A Panel Discussion featuring congregants Adolfo Guzman-Lopez, Maggie Kosmin, and Alain Silverston

The moment of receiving the Torah at Mount Sinai was a moment so powerful that its echo reverberated down the generations to the present day. To ritualize this moment the 16th century Kabbalists of Safed created an evening of all-night study (Tikkun Leil Shavuot), which concluded with a service at the break of dawn. 




