YES TO PEACE, NO TO VIOLENCE

Thirty years ago, in 1995, I participated in a peace rally in Tel Aviv. I had spent the summer in Europe and returned to Israel in late October, just in time to begin my final year of studies at Tel Aviv University. These were the days of the Oslo Peace Accords and the summer had seen a lot of political turmoil, such as the protest in Jerusalem with opposition leader Benjamin Netanyahu standing on a balcony while people below were carrying posters of the Prime Minister in Nazi uniform, or the incident when a young Itamar Ben-Gvir stole the hood ornament off of the Prime Minister's Cadillac. Because I had been away, I was unaware of much of what had taken place, but when I saw the signs advertising a rally in Tel Aviv titled "Yes to Peace, No to Violence", I knew I would join. The rally was on a Saturday night, and since there is no public transport on Shabbat, I walked in the afternoon from my apartment in Ramat Aviv to the plaza by City Hall, where the rally was taking place. There was a carnival atmosphere at the rally: politicians were giving speeches, artists were singing, and I was mostly walking among the crowd, connecting with people in the city that had been my home for more than three

When the rally ended and the people began to disperse, I was still hanging around talking to friends, some old and some I had just met. That's when I noticed the people who had been waiting at the fringes of the rally: settlers from the West Bank, identifiable by the large

kippot on their heads and the long tzitziot hanging from their waists. As the crowds thinned, the settlers moved in, and naturally discussions and arguments arose. While we had opposite political views, disagreeing about pretty much everything having to do with the peace process or the role of Israel in the West Bank, our interaction was measured and respectful, even friendly. Then, while we were talking in the middle of the nearly empty plaza, a person came from the direction of City Hall and asked the settlers to leave. They were taken aback: they had the right to be in Tel Aviv just like anyone else. We, the rally-goers, jumped to the defense of our newfound friends: we were just having a civil discussion, and we saw no reason why we should stop it. The person then told us that there were rumors about shots being fired near City Hall, and that the Prime Minister might have been hit. We exchanged a few more words, and agreed to disperse.

As I crossed Ibn Gevirol Street to wait for a bus home (it was after Shabbat), the mood was already very tense. The television in the kiosk by the bus stop was constantly blasting updates from outside Ichilov hospital, where the Prime Minister had been taken. A man with a large kippah and thick beard was angrily removing a sign from the front of a chartered bus. I stepped into the street suggesting that he take it easy, because people were a little hot-headed right now; he responded that he too was hot-headed. My bus arrived and I got on. I still hold onto the ticket; the purple dot-matrix ink is almost completely faded, but the print is still faintly visible: [Route] 24 04-11-95 22:50. I got back to my apartment building and climbed up the stairs to the fourth floor. Just as I reached the landing in front of my apartment door I heard a scream, coming simultaneously from all the apartments in the building. I understood what it meant. I quickly opened the door and turned on the television, which was replaying the announcement just made

outside the hospital by Eitan Haber, the Prime Minister's chief of staff: "The Government of Israel announces with shock, great sadness and deep sorrow the death of Prime Minister and Minister of Defense, Yitzhak Rabin, who was murdered by an assassin this evening in Tel Aviv."

The days after the assassination were very sad, but surprisingly optimistic. Teenagers gathered and lit candles at the assassination site and in many places around the country. They were called no'ar hanerot - "the candle youth" - and there was a sentiment that with youth that are so moved by the tragic outcome, a peaceful future was all but guaranteed. However, a string of suicide bombings in the coming months stalled the peace process, Netanyahu was elected prime minister the next summer, and with no progress on peace, the process collapsed within a few years. The teenagers of 1995 are in their forties today; they served as soldiers during the second intifada, and as reservists in the second Lebanon war and in the endless skirmishes in the Gaza Strip. Today, many of them have children in the military. However, despair is not a plan. While the extremists want us to remain in eternal war, there are many parties in Israel, the Arab countries, and worldwide who are working towards the vision of a peaceful and just settlement. The title of the rally, "Yes to Peace, No to Violence", is as relevant as ever.

CALLING ALL VOLUNTEERS!

There's lots of projects with the Social Action Committee that have a great impact on the community requiring coordinators. Here are some of them.

- Coordinate online purchase of plastic tarps. Repeats every year, SAC pays, ships direct to COA and St. Lukes for distribution.
- Warm clothes, blankets, jackets, etc. drive. Coordinate and confirm a date, write a blurb and arrange for drop off bins and times.
- Toothbrushes & Toothpaste: Hygiene kits would be lovely, but there's a large daily need for these two items. Organize some way for people to donate, purchase or drop off.
- St. Lukes Shower Program: Sort donated clothes with their team on

Thursday mornings or come serve a hot meal at lunch.

- JFCS: Get donations of Ensure/ Boost for senior cancer clinic at Memorial.
- COA & LBCC: Diaper Bank on Fridays for seniors and babies. Spread the word and get something going! Sanitary products too!
- Coats for KIDS: Annual program collecting used coats at LB Libraries, then they fill a coat closet at Roosevelt Elementary (across from Poly High). This is a well-established program so we just give people a way to participate.
- LB Senior Center: Does a coat drive every winter, also gets large grants to buy new coats.

- COA Always needs food donations, canned, and paper goods, etc. The Social Action Committee and volunteers do the 3rd Monday dinners, but they serve 400 meals a day and need everything, always!
- The Women's Shelter, LB Rescue Mission, Lydia's House for domestic violence victims and their kids, and Aids Foundation always have needs.

KOL M'YISRAEL / A VOICE FROM ISRAEL

Two years ago, I was starting to pack my suitcase from my trip home over the Sukkot holiday and preparing for the flight back to Tel Aviv. Etay came running in from the backyard, news playing on his phone, and stopped time for the next 738 days. This time, I was packing my suitcase again and checking into my flight. As had been the case innumerable times over the last two years, there was another round of pundits in the news discussing the latest possibility of a hostage and ceasefire deal. The chances felt higher than ever, especially after the summer's developments in Iran and Doha. Probably only my future children will learn what really happened behind the scenes to push this round of negotiations over the finish line, but already used to a disappointing end to the same story, I buried any hope and focused on more immediate tasks. Within a few hours, I was boarding my plane, hoping to get some respite, enjoy a vacation with my mother who was already in the air, and enjoy my friend's wedding which was the impetus for the trip.

Just like one day you can wake up and your country is at war, you can also wake up to a country at peace. In the hotel room before bed, friends texted me asking if I wanted to wake up early to go to Hostage Square to watch their return (and hopefully celebrate). I informed them that I cannot, and I think we also all held on to some doubt so that at the last moment, when things fell apart, our hope would be hedged. That morning however, when I awoke, the living hostages, without pomp and circumstance or climax, had all been returned to Israel. Two years of sorrow, of struggle, of horror, ended. All the emotions of that time that needed to survive the reality unfolding around me suddenly had their awaited moment of release, but nowhere to release them.

All the relevant activity was happening without me. In a way, most selfishly, I almost wish that their release could have happened when I was in Israel, to be able to go to join my friends at Hostage Square, and dance and sing with them, to feel the joy and ecstasy of the moment transform into a healing substance to release the tensions of war from the body. Instead, I landed back in Israel, and it felt like the last two years have become a distant stain in time. The stickers of the hostages' faces and fallen soldiers have started to peel, and beneath them stickers from the judicial coup and protests start to peek through. Of course, the ceasefire and the release of the living hostages is only a start to a slow healing process, but at least it is a start. We said that we were stuck for 738 days on October 7th. At last, we can say it's October 8th.





INTERFAITH GREETINGS Intensifying Attacks on Free Speech Endanger Religious Freedom and Multi-Faith Democracy

September 19, 2025 By Roni Love, SCIC Member

As a leading national advocate for religious freedom and civil rights, Interfaith Alliance is deeply alarmed by the intensifying atmosphere of censorship and aggressive crackdown on free speech that is unfolding in the United States. In the wake of the horrific assassination of Charlie Kirk, the organization is appalled by the proliferation of political violence and violent threats, as well as by blatantly authoritarian efforts to silence a wide range of legitimate constitutionally protected speech and activism.

Rev. Paul Brandeis Raushenbush, the President and CEO of Interfaith Alliance, released the following statement:

"The First Amendment, a fundamental pillar of our multi-faith democracy, protects the freedom of speech as well as the freedom of religion. When freedom of speech is under intense attack by the federal government, and individuals and organizations across the country are being intimidated out of exercising their fundamental rights to discuss and debate important issues, this represents a massive threat to democracy and to the rights of religious communities.

"The terrible scourge of hatred and political violence in our country can be best addressed by expanding and strengthening a vibrant, inclusive democracy where all communities, including all people of diverse faiths and beliefs can engage and coexist with one another peacefully, in accordance with our core constitutional freedoms. Utilizing instances of terrible violence and hate to fuel a crackdown on civil society, suppress free speech, remove prominent voices from the airwaves and intimidate the media into silence and collaboration is a recipe for more division and more danger.

"We have seen at previous moments in our history, including the McCarthy era, how attacks on First Amendment rights can quickly spiral into full-scale witch-hunts and repression in which individuals unjustly lose their livelihoods, communities are torn apart, and the fabric of our democracy is greatly weakened. In such moments, out-of-favor religious and ethnic minorities are particularly vulnerable to targeting and scapegoating.

The First Amendment protects our right to freely practice our faith, which is inextricably tied to our other first amendment rights to free speech and free assembly. Now is a critical moment to speak up and speak out in defense of religious freedom, free speech, free assembly, and all of our core democratic freedoms. We must show moral courage, and refuse to give in to intimidation and fear, and do everything in our power to build a stronger, healthier democratic society."

Interfaith Alliance recently filed an amicus curiae brief in Newsom v. Trump, supporting Governor Newsom and U.S. District Judge Charles Breyer's ruling that the Trump administration broke the law when it deployed approximately 4,000 National Guard soldiers and 700 Marines to Los Angeles in June during immigration enforcement operations and related protests. The brief argues that upholding this ruling is essential to protecting religious freedom, emphasizing that for many communities of faith, peaceful protest is a sacred religious practice protected by the Constitution.


Interfaith Alliance also played a leading role in organizing faith communities to participate in the recent No Kings rallies across the country on October 18, which brought millions of Americans into the streets to protest against the Trump Administration's perceived authoritarian and anti-democratic abuses of power, including their infringements on the freedoms of speech, assembly and religion.

Interfaith Alliance is a network of people of diverse faiths and beliefs from across the country working together to build a resilient democracy and fulfill America's promise of religious freedom and civil rights not just for some, but for all. We mobilize powerful coalitions to challenge Christian nationalism and religious extremism, while fostering a better understanding of the healthy boundaries between religion and government. We advocate at all levels of government for an equitable and just America where the freedoms of belief and religious practice are protected, and where all persons are treated with dignity and have the opportunity to thrive.
